From the Chairman...

Welcome from me as the new chairman of Woodham Walter Parish Council. My name is Mark Durham and this is my second spell as chairman, the last time being about ten years ago. Each Chairman serves a period of two years before handing over to another councillor to take the helm. My vice chairman elect is James Bunn and he is joined by the other councillors, Claire Robinson, David Potter, Peter Warren, Angus Neale and Colin Warner. We are kept in order and ably assisted by our wonderful clerk, Jacky Bannerman.

In my 15 plus years as a councillor, I have experienced four clerks and have come to realise that this is one of the most important roles in the community. It involves a considerable amount of work and commitment to keep on top of the never ending stream of correspondence, circulars and emails that have to be sorted, prioritised and actioned. Our monthly meeting minutes

only a small proportion of her work and there is no doubt that without her, we would not be able to function effectively.

This is the second set of published reports which are circulated prior to our Annual Parish Meeting. The aim of this booklet is to provide parishioners with a written summary of the things that have been going on in the village over the prior year. Members of the public are of course welcome to attend the meeting on Monday 11th April and I would strongly commend you to do so. Members of the public are also warmly invited to attend any or our monthly parish council meetings which take place on the second Monday of every month at The Women's club on Top Road. There is a public forum at the start of every meeting at which any subject that may be of concern can be raised.

This last year has been relacouncil. We donate approximately £1500 per year to various village organisations with the intention to provide much needed support in these difficult times. We believe that these clubs and organisations are a valuable asset to the people of the village and as such are worthy of our continuing financial assistance. We are very conscious that this money comes from each and every council tax payer in the village and we are careful to ensure that we are balanced and fair with these contributions.

One of the most important roles for the parish council is to be part of the consultation process for planning applications. Maldon District Council send us the full applications and we have a policy to speak to those neighbours who may be affected by the application. We then discuss each case at our meetings and use the results of the consultations and our own personal views on the merits or otherwise of the application. I must stress that none of the parish councillors are experts in planning law and although we sometimes get guidance from the relevant planning officer, our decisions are based on our opinions on how we feel it would impact on the village. On many occasions the final decision is contrary to our parish recommendation but there are often legal or planning policy reasons for this. Maldon District Council are relying much more on the planning officer to delegate the decision and in cases where there is no objection from the neighbours, parish council or ward district councillor this is always the case. However for larger applications or those that have attracted some objections they are referred to the Planning Committee. It has long been a concern of the Parish Council that neither applicants nor objectors were allowed to address the committee members at planning meetings. There is now a trial underway at MDC where concerned parties may make a short statement at meetings. Although this does not really go quite far enough, it is a start and it will give us a voice that we previously did not have.

This last year we had a total of 17 planning applications which included 2 listed building consents. We also had one appeal lodged. This is down on the 2010 number of 21 applications and further down on 26 in 2009. I think that this is largely due to the current economic situation in the UK. The other major planning matter that the council has been active with in the last year is that of the property known as Falconers Lodge. This has been a problem for a couple of years due to the fact that a previous owner had illegally altered the ground levels by means of dumping material on the site. This infringed a planning application for the property and therefore an enforcement notice was issued by Maldon District Council to restore the site. In the meantime the owner suffered bankruptcy and the site is now owned by Barclays Bank PLC. Also the ruins of Woodham Walter Hall, which are within the site boundary, were given legal protection by becoming scheduled as a National Monument in 2010. This effectively means that any work has to be overseen by archaeologists and future planning consent for this site will be strictly limited. I am very pleased that MDC are progressing the enforcement notice with Barclays Bank and we should see a resolution to this matter within the next few months.



As the village recovers from a particularly cold winter with two bouts of sever ice and snow, it was quite fortuitous that we purchased the salt bin at the end of last year. It was positioned to allow salt to be used to alleviate the icing of the hill from the end of Top Road to the Bell Pub. This has been very dangerous in previous years and in 2009 it was barely

passable at all. A few good Samaritans spread the salt on the road when the snow came in December and thanks to them the route remained passable. We have to hope that we don't have any more snow this winter as the bin is currently empty and we cannot rely on it being refilled for a couple of months.



Speeding continues to be a problem in the village and this has been one of my pet projects in recent years. The village benefits from the new gating and the Vehicle Activated Sign that we share with other parishes, but I remain convinced that in the absence of a regular police presence, the best solution is the community speed watch campaign. This is due for re-launch in the near future and Essex Police have put a lot more resources behind the scheme. We do need more volunteers however to make this viable. It will only require an hour or so every two or three weeks, full training is given and from this spring we are advised that a police officer will attend every four weeks to assist and issue speeding tickets if these are needed. One of the most irritating matters that is frequently raised at meetings is that of litter and dog fouling. We are all justly proud of our village surroundings and by far the majority of litter comes from cars as they drive through, hurling rubbish out of the window. We do have an 'adopt a road' scheme that works very well and an annual community litter pick, however I would urge everyone not to walk past a piece of litter, but pick it up and put it in a bin. The 2011 litter pick took place in mid February with 14 adults and two children turning up to help. A staggering total of 47 bin bags and 11 tyres were collected during the morning. Although the area covered was wider this year, this is a worrying figure, as it represents nearly double the amount from



Dog fouling is yet another example of antisocial behaviour. Those people who walk their dogs in the village should take great care not to let

them foul the paths and pavements, this is particularly unpleasant by the school and nursery, both being locations where we get numerous complaints. Please, bag it and bin it!

I would like to take this opportunity to thank a few people and welcome some new personalities to the village. Firstly thank-you to the contractors that we use in Woodham Walter. Paul from Blackwater Landscapes, our lighting contractors and to the management & green staff of The Warren Golf Club for cutting Bell Meadow. We welcome our new Vicar to the parish, Rev'd Stephanie Stroebel and our new shopkeepers Simon and Marilyn. Welcome to you and indeed to any new resident of Woodham Walter that has moved here in the last 12 months.

Just before Christmas the village saw the retirement of a person who has made one of the most significant contributions to Woodham Walter in recent years. Derek (Del) Butcher is



someone that many in the parish may not even be aware of, but as manager and warden of the Wood Corner gypsy site since it opened, he has worked to make the site one of the best in Essex. I have been on the council long enough to recall the strong concerns that many people had prior to the site opening and I think it is fair to say that this facility has been a credit to the Gypsy Services Department of Essex County Council, but most of all to Del Butcher.

In May this year Councillor Mrs Sheila Young is retiring from being our ward councillor at Maldon District Council. Mrs Young has served Woodham Walter and the other villages in her ward since 1995. During this time she has worked tirelessly for the community and held the prestigious position of Chair of the Council for two years.





Finally, a warm thank-you to my fellow councillors and clerk. You make the job of chairman both easier and enjoyable by your help and support. I have another year before I give up the chair to the next chairman and I am pretty sure that there will be a few challenges to come our way in the coming months. I am fiercely proud of this village and the incredible community spirit that we all enjoy. I trust that parishioners of Woodham Walter are happy with the way that your parish council look after your interests and that you entrust this job to us for another year.

What do Parish Councils do?

Powers and duties Parish councils have a large range of powers and activities.

Woodham Walter Parish Council is involved in planning consultations, managing Bell Meadow, the care and upkeep of the village, liaising with Highways, street lighting, allotments, promoting the village and any other local issues.

We provide community funding to local organisations to help with maintenance including Woodham Walter Women's Club, Woodham Walter Village Hall Association and St Michael's Church. We regularly contribute to the Parish Magazine and also make annual grants under the heading "Entertainment & The Arts" to Silver Threads club and the Bell Meadow Village Association. We give an annual grant to the Essex Wildlife Trust towards their work

managing Woodham Walter Common.

Spending plans include maintenance work at the War Memorial Shelter outside Chapel Stores and new nets for the football posts on Bell Meadow along with our other regular expenditure.

How parish councils work

Parish councils are statutory bodies. Members are elected for a term of four years. 2011 is an election year and we are due to begin the process. The deadline for nominations is 4th April with a view to an election being held if necessary on 5th May – if the number of nominees does not exceed the number of vacancies a poll will not be required.

Parish Councils are funded principally by an annual precept. Income and expenditure for the next financial year are calculated in the form of estimates. The net amount (the precept) is added to council tax, collected by Maldon District Council (the principal authority) and paid to Woodham Walter Parish Council annually. Parish councils can apply for other funding such as grant and funding awards, but they do not receive funds direct from central government, as principal authorities do.

Woodham Walter Parish Council also receives income from the hire of the Party Tents. During 2010 we raised £675 in hiring income.

Councillors have agreed that the precept requirement for Woodham Walter in 2011/12 will remain the same as in 2010/11 at £10,449.00 which works out at £36.79 per Band D property for the year.

What do Parish Councillors do?

As a councillor you become a voice for your community. Parish Councils are the most local part of our democratic system and are closest to the public.

Councillors have three main areas of work:

1. Decision-making: through attending meetings and committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented. Woodham Walter Parish Council meets on the 2nd Monday of the month at 8pm for approximately 2 hours.

- 2. Monitoring: councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
- 3. Getting involved locally: as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. This often depends on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available.

The work of a parish councillor may include:

- going to meetings of local organisations
- going to meetings of bodies that affect the wider community,

such as the police, the Highways Authority, the local Council and schools

- taking up issues on behalf of members of the public.
- Neighbour consultations for planning applications.
- Inspections of Bell Meadow and the Community Playground at the school.

Being a parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

Last May saw the end of my time as Chairman of Maldon District Council

For two years 2009-2010 I had the honour to serve as Chairman of

the District which includes Burnham-on-Crouch as well as Maldon.

It was an extremely hectic but a very interesting and rewarding experience. One of the most amazing things that struck me was the number of voluntary groups in operation. David Cameron take note, this is your "Big Society" already in action.

The District of Maldon, as we all know has some beautiful country-side, fascinating history and archaeology, coupled with two well used rivers and parks.

Oh yes! We have all this but the really best part is the people, and I met quite a few in my two years. The rest of Essex knows about Maldon.

Now what has all this got to do with a report about what has been going on in 2009-2011 at MDC. Quite a lot really because it is about people.

I would like to highlight some of the good things that have been going on and which we hope will keep going.

At the last Council meeting the Leader of the Council gave a glimpse of last year.

The Revenue and Benefits Team continue to maintain an excellent record in the processing of benefit applications, collection of Council Tax and business rates. They have achieved a Highly Commended Award at the prestigious IRRV Benefits Team of the Year Awards. The Private Sector Housing Team have greatly improved its processing of the Disabled Facilities grant.

With ever increasing demands, the Housing Team has also managed to avoid the use of Bed & Breakfast accommodation and lessen the use of temporary accommodation.

The Benefits & Fraud Team investigation has been very successful in addressing attempts to commit fraud. For the current financial year to date 65 cases of benefit fraud have been proved with overpaid benefits totalling at least £92,400.

The Green Flag status has again been maintained for the Promenade Park, Oak Tree Meadow and Burnham Riverside Park.

The Park Rangers Team has filmed a D.V.D. on the excellent work they do. They are part of a National Community Safety Accreditation scheme which allows rangers to confiscate alcohol, takes names and addresses, tackle anti-social behaviour and deal with litter and dog fouling.

The Tourist Information Centre continues to produce excellent booklets on "Where to go" and "What to do", new ones are coming out all the time e.g. New Maldon Tourist Guide. They have received another Highly Commended Award from East England Tourist Board Scheme.

As the squeeze on funding begins to bite we have been looking at all our services. Regretfully we have had to cut the amount we give to the Voluntary Sector and to encourage them to find funding elsewhere.

We have been working in partnership with other authorities and different groups for some time. The Emergency Planning Services is one and the District has responded to several incidents including a major fire.

Regarding Planning Services, which is always something which people feel strongly about, from both sides of the spectrum. A number of improvements have been made and more staff employed to fill vacant posts. There is tighter caseload management within the Development Control Team which has helped our performance significantly. A much needed improvement to our Planning Enforcement Service which I am very pleased to see.

A number of things mentioned are already being resolved. The really good news is of course No Council Tax rise. We are in reasonably good health money wise. There will probably be more working in partnerships with others.

This is for the future but I am sure Maldon District Council will continue to "Punch above its weight" and the residents of the District will continue to be the kindly, helpful and courteous people they have always been.

Many thanks to all members of Woodham Walter Parish Council and for the residents of Woodham Walter for ploughing through this report.

There is much going on. We do have some good officers who are working really heard. I think Fiona Marshal the new C.E. has had a big task but I think everyone is getting there. Time will tell!

When new people come on the Council it will be most interesting.

Footpath Officer - Peter Warren



I'm still regularly walking the parish paths making sure that there is nothing amiss. Having a dog means a walk every day come rain or shine (longer when it's shine, not quite so long when it's rain!). There are 33 public rights of way in the parish (28 footpaths and 5 bridleways) and I try to cover all of them several times during the course of the year.

The most common problem is that of paths becoming impassable, either due to fallen trees, impenetrable crops (particularly oilseed rape), or overgrown with weeds such as nettles. Also farmers ploughing up the path can make walking difficult. Fortunately it's been a good year for all of these things. Only a couple of trees have fallen across paths, not much rape was planted in the parish and ECC cut 14 of our paths mid-August keeping the nettles under control for the rest of the year. Not so good was the wet autumn and snowy winter making most of our paths exceptionally muddy and at times flooded.

I've received good support from Nicky Coleman, the Essex County Council Public Rights of Way Officer for Mid-Essex.


Despite the financial cutbacks anything that needed attention has been rectified promptly. After a couple of incidents where walkers have ended up flat on their backs several of our 17 bridges have been made safer with new handrails.

Two bridges have been completely rebuilt, on FP6 Bassetts



Lane to Retreat Farm and on FP4 Gun Hill to West Bowers, the latter being trialled with anti-slip strips. Three of the new wooden fingerposts have been taken by persons unknown (cheap firewood?) and have been replaced. Half a dozen additional waymark posts have been erected and about the same number replaced where they have rotted and fallen over. Also I've replaced or added many waymark discs.

We are very lucky in Woodham Walter to have such beautiful walks in countryside that varies from open farmland to dense woodland with a canal thrown in for good measure. Moving forward



Woodham Walter Common - Chris Wheadon



General.

Working parties have undertaken normal maintenance concentrating on removal of bramble and bracken from both bog areas downstream of Pheasanthouse Farm. This work is ongoing.

Work has also included the continued removal of the invasive species Himalayan Balsam. This particular work is wholly undertaken in the bed of the stream near Twitty Fee. This work is ongoing.

Removal of bracken from the newly created Heather area will continue as and when necessary.

Projects

- (1) Water Level Monitoring. Following the installation of the measuring equipment and subsequent readings taken by the Hydrologists. The Trust will continue the monitoring process. Initial visual inspection of both bogs indicates that water levels in both bogs remain stable, which is encouraging. Further upland tree/shrub removal could be undertaken as necessary when time and money permit.
- (2) Heath land Regeneration. The upland area of 1/3 acre (0.15 ha) already earmarked for regeneration and reseeded with Heather in 2010 has been further hand cleared of new invasive bracken. I am pleased to report that a few new Heather shoots have started to appear, despite the harsh winter. It may be some time before the area completely regenerates, however the new growth is a good sign and the newly created open space may encourage butterfly species such as the Heath Fritillary and Purple Hairstreak.
- (3) Bridleways/Footpaths. The ECC Team replaced a number of

Footpath signposts in 2010, however, we still have two damaged Bridleway way mark signs/posts, that need replacing, this matter has recently been referred to Councillor Peter Warren, Footpaths Officer for Woodham Walter Parish Council. Councillor Warren has arranged for new posts to be delivered by Essex County Council. He and I will install them and attach necessary waymarking. Unfortunately we did have an accident on a Bridleway in September when a mountain biker collided with a horse rider. Fortunately none of the parties were injured although the horse did sustain minor cuts to a hind leg. It was subsequently decided to erect appropriate signage worded in a manner agreeable to both the Essex Wildlife Trust and Woodham Walter Parish Council.



Encroachment on Badger Set. A situation had occurred where a new mountain bike path had been created through an existing and established Badger Set. I have now obstructed the path using felled holly bushes, effectively closing it.

Dormice. As the survey concluded that there are very few, if any, Dormice on Woodham Walter Common, work on establishing Dormouse numbers continues on adjoining EWT Reserves.

Damage caused by creation of Mountain Bike Circular Track (2010)

I reported last March that a Mountain Bike "track" had been created primarily on land owned by The Warren Golf Course; however there had also been some encroachment onto Woodham Walter Common. I am pleased to report that the culprits

have not returned, and to my knowledge no further damage has occurred.

Additional Matters

- (1) Members of Woodham Walter Parish Council were invited to have a mini tour of the Common. This visit took place on Tuesday 23rd of November 2010. Councillors, Robinson, Neale, and Warren were able to attend. The tour was led by Leanne Sergeant, accompanied by myself. The tour highlighted the work of The Trust, the overall situation, and objectives, management of the woodland, bogs and heather areas. Important issues such as damage caused by deer were discussed; Councillors were shown examples of this damage in coppiced areas. Leanne explained how this problem is addressed on some other Trust Reserves by management of the deer population
- (2) A new "Steep Slope" warning sign has been erected next to the path which runs North/South adjacent to The Warrren Golf Club. The sign was erected at the top of the slope leading down to the stream as I had noticed numerous skid marks left by mountain bikes, indicating violent and sustained braking once the severe incline had been encountered.



(3) A Common Buzzard as reported last year has been seen on the Northern edge of The Common near Bunsay Downs Golf Club. A buzzard has also been sighted near Pheasanthouse Wood, by another Warden, very likely to be the same bird.

Friends of St Michael's Church - Malcolm Bunn

The "Friends " organisation was set up in the summer of 2005, so we are now into our 6th. year. It is an <u>independent</u> organisation, <u>separate</u> from the Parochial Church Council.

Its aims are to assist the P.C.C. financially and otherwise, in all aspects of the preservation, maintenance and conservation of the Church fabric (and Churchyard), to ensure that our beautiful old Church can remain at the heart of our rural community for future generations. Membership is open to everyone and is not restricted to worshippers.

Since we began, we have raised over £15,000 through membership subscriptions; very generous donations from our Members and other fundraising activities.

Currently we have approaching 150 individual members drawn from 80 family groups.

By the use of Working Parties we have been able to keep costs down significantly and achieve the successful completion of more projects. During the last five and a half years we have had 25 working parties.

Some have been small and specific to a particular task (such as the new ladder to the bell tower) involving 2 people and some have involved upwards of 25 people working hard in the Churchyard.

In last year's report I listed <u>eleven</u> projects which had been completed. I also mentioned six future projects.

One of the most significant of these is the work needed on the South & West internal walls of the Church, to remedy a serious damp problem which is damaging the brickwork. Associated with that work, is the proposed re-opening of the "bricked-up" door in the South wall of the Church, which was closed off more than a century ago. I am reliably informed that the cost of such work (to include a new Oak door) would be in excess of £20,000. Clearly this is a huge amount and the "Friends" will need all of their fund-raising skills, if this project is to be tackled.



Another priority project concerns a proposed Kitchenette, to enable a direct water supply and sink facilities, at the rear of the church, (to replace the current primitive arrangements) for when catering requirements are needed. (For example, services which are followed by light refreshments such as Carol services; Harvest festivals etc., and working parties.)

There are many other "deserving" projects and the Friends continue to liaise with the Churchwarden and the P.C.C. to agree upon priorities.

On top of all the excellent work done by the working parties, we achieved a 3rd Prize in the Rural Community Council of Essex competition for the best kept Churchyard in 2010. (Our first ever entry & a prize of £50.!)

Our Working Parties are advertised on posters in the village and in the Parish Magazine. We continue to fund-raise at the July Flower festival and on Bell Meadow day.

The Committee would like to thank the membership for their outstanding support and generous donations <u>and</u> many other people, who, although not members, turn out and support us. As chairman I would like to thank all the committee members for their unstinting support and hard work.

New members are always welcome.

September saw some changes to our previous session times due to parental demand and changes to the government funding. We now offer the option of Tuesday and Thursday as all day sessions; this has proved very popular with parents and children alike. We still take into consideration the needs of the younger children and so devote Monday and Wednesday morning sessions to them, this allows them to become familiar with the staff, routines etc and allows them to become settled and confident before moving up to the older children's sessions.

We always take the time to listen to the children and offer a child initiated curriculum, in line with the EYFS, this means that what we do is based around the children's interests. This approach makes the children feel important and valued, and they thoroughly enjoy the control allowed when choosing the activities they would like out on their next session. We also operate our free flow system into the garden, which means that come rain or shine we have great fun outside with our umbrellas and wellys.

At Tadpoles we work closely with our parents and carers. We do this by ensuring parents receive comprehensive information on the nursery by giving them a induction pack detailing all the most relevant information, and informing parent/carers of our open door policy. Parents are invited to attend termly stay and plays where the child and key person together, share with the parent, their learning journey. Parents receive regular newsletters and have access to daily information on our notice board. Parents/ carers also help with walks to the school, around the village, to bell meadow and to the allotment.

Neighbourhood Watch - Brian Cumming



This last year the village has been subject to a number of criminal actions:-

- A section of lead was stolen from part of the Church roof allowing water to enter part of the building
- A break-in and theft of valuables from a private house
- An attempted break-in at the post office
- Theft of a number of garden ornaments
- An attempted theft from a garage and workshop.

None of this would be ranked as 'serious crime' but it is very distressing to those involved and it illustrates that we all need to keep our eyes and ears open.

I regularly attend meetings of the NHW area coordinators run by one of the local coordinators. These meetings typically take place every 2 months. The good news this year is that the Police are again funding a liaison position and the area coordinators are once more receiving regular reports from the local police highlighting key matters of current concern

I have links with Little Baddow NHW (who are linked to Chelmsford Police) and this is also a valuable source of local information.

Whenever there is a matter of concern to raise with the villagers I communicate this through the parish magazine and I have written four articles for the magazine during the year. Issues raised in this way have included the following:-

- A variety of phone scams involving attempts to elicit credit card information, attempts to place costly viruses on computers and attempts to embezzle money through claims of outstanding phone bills.
- The theft of tools from vans
- The theft of catalysts from cars
- Door to door salesmen making false claims about official backing
- Security system sales people making false claims about police backing

As always I encourage everyone to remain aware of those around the village and to alert the police immediately (using 999) if they believe that there is something suspicious going on. The great majority of crime in the Maldon area is opportunistic and simply ensuring that our homes and vehicles are secure would help greatly in reducing such problems.

Community Speed Watch



The aim of the traffic monitoring Community Speed Watch initiative is to address the problem of either real or perceived speeding. This is done in partnership with the community and police. Woodham Walter Parish Council were instrumental in organising the scheme in the village back in 2007 and it is now set for a re-launch with increased support from Essex Police insuring the scheme receives the right level of reassurance and enforcement.

Community Speed Watch members are not Police or County Council employees but members of the local community who want to make a real difference to the speed of vehicles through the village. Using a handheld radar gun, they capture the speed of offending vehicles, record the necessary data and send it to the police. This information is logged on the police computer where further checks can be made into insurance, tax etc. The police then send the registered keepers a warning letter explaining the dangers and problems caused by speeding. Persistent individuals may then be targeted by the police who will prosecute them if they are caught.

Essex Police are due to re-launch the Community Speed Watch initiative

with further support via the use of police staff, neighbourhood policing teams, special constables and police community support officers this should include visiting Woodham Walter on a regular basis to back up the monitoring work done by the local team.

More volunteers are needed in Woodham Walter, the commitment required only needs to be an hour every two or three weeks. Full training will be given on how to use the detecting equipment, how to record the data, health and safety at the roadside and basic conflict resolution techniques. Police - PS Phil Morley



The village of Woodham Walter forms part of the Purleigh Policing area which currently falls within the Maldon

Neighbourhood Policing District. The main Police Station for the area is located in West Square, Maldon and the office is open daily between the hours of 0900 and 1700. There are extended opening hours on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday when the office is open between 0800 and 2000 hours.

Whilst these are the opening hours for the office Officers operate from Maldon Police Station on a 24/7 basis. Officers can be contacted at the station by calling 0300 333 4444.

The Purleigh Policing area encompasses the majority of the villages in the South West of the Maldon area and stretches from Wickham Bishops to North Fambridge and across to Latchingdon.

Between the 1st of April 2010 and the 31st of December 2010 Essex Police dealt with 77,361 crimes of which 22,909 were detected giving an overall detection rate of 29.61%. This is an overall reduction in Crime of

1,946 crimes from the previous year.

For the same period the Maldon District dealt with 1735 crimes, detecting 518 of those, giving a detection rate of 29.86%. This is a reduction of 81 crimes, an increase of 35 detections and an increased detection rate of 3.26% compared to the same period in the previous year.

The Maldon District continues to be plagued by incidents of Acquisitive Crime (Theft from cars, garages, sheds etc.). There has been an increase of 22 offences of theft from motor vehicle and an increase of 24 offences of Burglary Other. In addition to these offences the District also saw a large spate of Theft of Chimney Pots and other garden ornaments during the autumn months. This was a particular problem for the villages in the North and West of the District.

In the current financial climate we are seeing an increase in a number of different crimes but of particular concern for the more rural areas is the Theft of heating oil. We have had a few incidents recently where several hundreds of litres of oil have been stolen from domestic storage tanks. Another crime that is on the increase

is the theft of metal objects. We have had incidents of the theft of wire cabling but have also seen the theft of lead from people's houses as well as the theft of garden gates and drain covers.

If you see anybody acting suspiciously please do not hesitate to contact the police as soon as possible.

The 'One Place on Wheels' initiative that sees the Mobile Police Station visiting the parishes within the Maldon District is now into its second year. This is a joint project between the Maldon Neighbourhood Policing Team and the Dengie Project Trust. This normally takes place during the second week of the month and will be at Woodham Walter Village Hall between 1300 and 1400 hours on the Friday.
