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From the Chairman...

Welcome from me as the chairman of Woodham Walter Parish Council. I am coming to the end of my two year's as the Chairman and will be handing over the reigns at the May Parish Council meeting and AGM.

This year has seen several changes on the Parish Council line up, May 2011 saw the Parish Council elections and we said thank you to Claire Robinson who stood down at this time after 3 years as a councillor. The Vice Chairman over the past couple of years has been James Bunn and he is joined by the other councillors David Potter and Peter Warren and our first new councillor of the year, Andrew Newland. In June Colin Warner left the Parish Council after some 24 years of sterling service and we thanked him with a presentation of an engraved hip flask.

He was replaced by Gill Orford in August. Angus Neale stepped down in October after 4 years as a councillor, he was instrumental in forming the Allotments Association and we thank him for his dedication to this project. Angus was re-

placed by our newest recruit Joanna Symons who was welcomed onto the Parish Council in January.

We are kept in order by Jacky Bannerman, the role of the parish clerk and responsible financial officer is one of the most important in the community and involves a considerable amount of work and commitment to keep on top of the never ending stream of correspondence, circulars and emails that have to be sorted, prioritised and actioned. Our monthly meeting minutes and agendas actually form only a small proportion of her work and there is no doubt that without her, we would not be able to function effectively.

Members of the public are of course welcome to attend the Annual Parish meeting on Tuesday 10th April and I would strongly commend you to do so. Members of the public are also warmly invited to attend any or our monthly parish council meetings which take place on the second Monday of every month at The Women's club on Top Road. There is a public forum at the start of every meeting at which any subject that may be of concern can be raised.

We donate approximately £1500 per year to various village organisations with the intention to provide much needed support in these difficult times. We believe that these clubs and organisations are a valuable asset to the people of the village and as such are worthy of our continuing financial assistance. We are very conscious that this money comes from each and every council tax payer in the village and we are careful to ensure

that we are balanced and fair with these contributions.

One of the most important roles for the parish council is to be part of the consultation process for planning applications. Maldon District Council send us the full applications and we have a policy to speak to those neighbours who may be affected by the application. We then discuss each case at our meetings and use the results of the consultations and our own personal views on the merits or otherwise of the application. I must stress that none of the parish councillors are experts in planning law and although we sometimes get guidance from the relevant planning officer, our decisions are based on our opinions and on how we feel it would



impact on the village. On many occasions the final decision is contrary to our parish recommendation but there are often legal or planning policy reasons for this. Maldon District Council are relying much more on the planning officer to delegate the decision. However for larger applications or those that have attracted some objections they are referred to the Planning Committee. We are pleased that MDC does now allow a representative from the Parish Council along with the applicant and one objector to address the committee at planning meetings. This does now give us a voice that we previously did not have.

This last year we had a total of 17 planning applications which included 2 listed building consents. This is the same number as in 2011. One of the major planning matters over the last couple of years is that of the property known as Falconers Lodge. A previous owner had illegally altered the ground levels by means of dumping material on the site. This infringed a planning application for the property and therefore an enforcement notice was issued by MDC to restore the site. We are pleased to report that following a change of ownership finally the remedial work has been done under the supervision of English Heritage as the ruins of Woodham Walter Hall, which are also within the site boundary, were given legal protection by becoming scheduled as a National Monument in 2010.

In August we were informed of an Essex County Council consultation affecting Woodham Walter parish, the proposed gravel extraction site at Whitehouse Farm. An extraordinary Parish Council meeting was called in September and attended by over 100 people.

The parish council presented information on the application and how to respond. Since the extraordinary meeting we have received many very positive comments on the way that the meeting was conducted and the useful and balanced information presented. Following the meeting our website was updated and received more hits than ever before with 410 visitors over a 3 month period. (Average monthly usage previously was 30. Since then our average monthly website visitors has increased to 53). Councillors then drafted our response to the consultation. I should thank all councillors for their considerable time commitment during this process and particularly Cllr. Andrew Newland and the clerk for their time in researching and submitting the final comprehensive response. We had expected that the Minerals Development Document (including: Whitehouse Farm Site) would have been published by now but we have been informed that the timetable for the publication has been delayed, probably until the autumn.



This year the winter was not too severe, this was especially lucky as despite our best efforts over several months we only managed to get the salt

bin at the Top Road junction refilled by Highways 4 days after the snow had come! Additionally to the salt bin we are pleased to have taken part in Essex County Council's new Winter Salt Scheme. They have provided some additional bags of salt/grit for volunteers to store and use in strategic locations such as the pavements adjacent to Old Chapel Stores, the Church and the junctions each end of Top Road and The Bell. This proved to be a great success thanks to the hard work of some dedicated volunteers who first cleared the snow and then applied the salt.

Speeding continues to be a problem in the village and this has been one of my pet projects in recent years. The village benefits from the gating and the Vehicle Activated Sign that we share with other parishes, but I remain convinced that in the absence of a regular police presence, the best solution is the Community Speed Watch campaign. We do need more volunteers however to make this viable. It will only require an hour or so every two or three weeks. If you are interested in making a real difference to our community, please contact our parish clerk.

One of the most irritating matters that is frequently raised at meetings is that of litter and dog fouling. We are all justly proud of our village surroundings and by far the majority of litter comes from cars as they drive through, hurling rubbish out of the window. We do have an 'adopt a road' scheme that works very well and an annual community litter pick, however I would urge everyone not to walk past a piece of litter, but pick it up and put it in a bin. The 2012 litter pick took place in mid February with 6 adults and one child turning up to help on the day, plus other volunteers who collected during the days and weeks preceding the pick. 28



bags, a wooden cabinet and fire extinguisher were collected during the morning along with reports of several tyres which were advised to the council for collection. Thanks to our dedicated volunteers we have been able to litter pick the entire parish. Dog fouling is yet another example of anti-social behaviour. Those people who walk their dogs in the village should take great care not to let them foul the paths and pavements, this is particularly unpleasant by the school and nursery, both being locations where we get numerous complaints. Please, bag it and bin it!



I would like to take this opportunity to thank a few people. Firstly thank-you to the contractors that we use in Woodham Walter. Paul from Blackwater Landscapes, our lighting contractors and to the management & green staff of The Warren Golf Club for cutting Bell Meadow. I would like to welcome any new resident of Woodham Walter that has moved here in the last 12 months.

The Parish Council was delighted to learn that during the year both Tadpoles Nursery and Woodham Walter Primary School have received "Outstanding" status from Ofsted. Congratulations to both.







What do Parish Councils do?

Powers and duties

Parish councils have a large range of powers and activities. Woodham Walter Parish Council is involved in planning consultations, managing Bell Meadow, the care and upkeep of the village, liaising with Highways, street lighting, allotments, promoting the village and any other local issues.

We provide community funding to local organisations to help with maintenance including Woodham Walter Women's Club, Woodham Walter Village Hall Association and St Michael's Church. We regularly contribute to the Parish Magazine and also make annual grants under the heading "Entertainment & The Arts" to Silver Threads dub and the Bell

Meadow Village Association. We give an annual grant to the Essex Wildlife Trust towards their work managing Woodham Walter Common.

Spending plans for 2012 include contributing to the Diamond Jubilee Street Party and giving a small memento to all the children in the panish along with our other regular expenditure.

How parish councils work

Parish councils are statutory bodies. Members are elected for a term of four years 2011 was an election year.

Parish Councils are funded principally by an annual precept. Income and expenditure for the next financial year are calculated in the form of estimates. The net amount (the precept) is added to council tax, collected by Maldon District Council (the principal authority) and paid to Woodham Walter Parish Council annually. Parish councils can apply for other funding such as grant and funding awards, but they do not receive funds direct from central government, as principal authorities do.

Woodham Walter Parish Council also receives income from the hire of the Party Tents. During 2011 we raised £225 in hiring income.

Councillors have agreed that the precept requirement for Woodham Walter in 2012/13 will reduce by 15% to £8881.65 which works out at £31.73 per Band D property for the year.

What do Parish Councillors do?

As a councillor you become a voice for your community. Parish Councils are the most local part of our democratic system and closest to the public.

Councillors have three main areas of work:

1. Decision-making: through attending meetings and committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented. Woodham Walter Parish Council meets on the 2nd Monday of the month at 8pm for approximately 2 hours

- 2. Monitoring: councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
- 3. Getting involved locally: as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. This often depends on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available.

The work of a parish councillor may include:

- going to meetings of local organisations
- going to meetings of bodies that affect the wider community, such as the police, the

Highways Authority, the local Council and schools

- taking up issues on behalf of members of the public.
- Neighbour consultations for planning applications.
- Inspections of Bell Meadow and the Community Playground at the school.

Being a parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

What do Parish Clerks do?



The Parish Clerk & Responsible Financial Officer of Woodham Walter Parish Council is Jacky Bannerman. She has been the derk for just over 4 years.

Jacky lives in Woodham Walter with her husband Graham and two children, Ellie who attends The Sandon School and Fergus who is currently at Tadpoles Nursery and will start at Woodham Walter Primary School in September.

"Being the Parish Clerk is an enjoyable job. I feel very much part of the community which is important to me. My career has always been in admin (before our children, I worked as a Production Assistant at the BBC in London) so this is the ideal job for fitting in with my family life and other commitments and in a familiar clerical/secretarial role.

I am lucky to have a team of supportive, hardworking and loyal councillors - they don't get paid for their time but the Parish Gerk is a paid position."

The Parish Clerk is the Proper Officer of the Council and as such is under a statutory duty to carry out all the functions, and in particular to serve or issue all the notifications required by law.

The Parish Clerk is accountable to the Council for the management of all its resources. The Clerk advises councillors and produces the information required to help them make effective decisions and is then responsible for ensuring that the instructions of the Parish Council are carried out.

The Clerk is also the Responsible Financial Officer and must ensure that all financial records of the Council are maintained and administered correctly.

The Localism Act is likely to expand the role of the Parish Council and the workload and responsibilities of Parish Clerks.

Responsibilities Include:

- 1. To ensure that statutory and other provisions governing or affecting the running of the Council are observed.
- 2. To receive and report on invoices and prepare payments, to issue invoices on behalf of the council as necessary, to monitor and balance the Council's accounts and prepare records for audit purposes and VAT.
- 3. To prepare, in consultation with appropriate member/s, agendas for meetings and display them on the noticeboard (adjacent to Old Chapel Stores) and on the website of the Council. To attend such meetings and be responsible for minutes for approval.
- 4. To update the Woodham Walter Parish Council website.

- 5. To attend all meetings of the Council and all meetings of its committees and sub-committees.
- 6. To receive correspondence and documents on behalf of the Council and to deal with or bring such items to the attention of the Council. To issue correspondence as a result of instructions of, or the known policy of, the Council.
- 7. To draw up as a result of suggestions by Councillors, proposals for consideration by the Council and to advise on the practicability and likely effects of specific courses of action. 8. To complete any other tasks the Council may reasonably require and to act as the representative of the Council as required. 9. To issue notices and prepare agendas and minutes for the Annual Parish Meeting; to attend the Meeting and to implement the decisions made at the Assembly as agreed by the Council. To prepare the written Annual Parish Report, liaising with contributors and printer. 10. To attend training courses or seminars on the work and role of the Clerk as required by the Council.

District Councillor, Mark Durham





Just after Christmas 2010 I was formally nominated as a candidate for the seat of Wickham Bishops & The Woodhams for the local elections. This was a huge honour and came about due to the retirement of Sheila Young who was the sitting councillor. The ward is a large one and therefore has two councillors, myself and Henry Bass who lives in Wickham Bishops. Prior to the election date, we both did some local canvassing and hopefully most people saw and read our campaign leaflet. On Election Day, we were both elected with healthy majorities and took our seats at the end of May.

As a district councillor I am obliged to sit on the planning committee for the area that covers this ward, North West Planning. We then have a choice of another committee to sit on and I was selected for The Community Services Committee and Cllr. Bass sits on The Planning & Licensing committee. This means that between us, we cover most key workings of the council that affect our parish-

ioners. On occasions we are asked to substitute at other committees when another member cannot attend. This is actually a good way to see how the rest of the council operates and to date I have attended all of the other committees. The Finance & Corporate Services and Overview and Scrutiny Committees. We also get involved in other partnership meetings representing Maldon District Council and internal working groups etc. I am at present a member of The Gypsy & Traveller Working Group which is proving very interesting.

If I had to be totally honest, I had not anticipated the amount of time and work that is involved being a District Councillor. Despite having been on Woodham Walter Parish Council for 16 years, Iwas not prepared for the difference in the roles and it has taken a few months to get into a routine. I try to attend Parish Council meetings in the other villages in the ward as well as keeping my current position of Chairman of Woodham Walter Parish Council. However the scheduling of meetings at MDC has meant that I miss many parish meetings for which I am sad. It is my belief that our job as District Councillors should be to represent each and every parishioner and the best way to do this is via parish meetings. As the new Localism Act has passed into law, I am expecting quite a few changes as the aim is to encourage government from the bottom up rather than from Westminster down. It is still early days, but we are already seeing changes to planning policy etc. One of the most significant

changes that started recently is the opportunity for members of the public to speak at any council committee meeting. This is something that as a parish councillor, I campaigned for many years, but has only just been adopted since the May election. Any member of the public can attend any meeting and request to speak about an item that appears on the agenda. Although this is limited to two minutes, it is a major step forward for local democracy. Iwould urge parishioners to look at committee agendas on the website and attend the meetings to see how these things are dealt with at committee. We have noted a gradual increase in the number of public spectators at meetings and on a couple of occasions, it has been standing room only! Mostly it is only one or two stalwarts and the press watching us in action.

I do have to extend an apology to my Postman / lady for the huge increase in mail that they have to deliver to my house almost daily. In this electronic age, I remain staggered at the volume of paperwork that is generated and mailed out for us to read.

In these difficult economic times, Maldon District Council has to make considerable cost savings due to a cut in the money it receives from central government. Fortunately the financial affairs of the council have been well managed and we still enjoy the luxury of a considerable reserve of money. However as the government subsidy decreases year on year, we will be eating into the reserves within two or three years.

District Councillor, Mark Durham

The council has to provide many front line services to everyone in the district and the range and variety of costs is quite staggering. We have however recently signed a new waste collection contract for the next five years which will retain weekly collections and give considerable cost savings. Every item of expenditure is looked at annually and council members debate these at a number of budget meetings. It is inevitable that some services have to be cut and unfortunately the weekly collection of green waste has now ceased as it was not seen to give good value for the rate payer's money. MDC do offer a green waste wheelie bin service where it is collected from your property like the general waste. The cost of these bins has been reduced to less than £30 per year, which I believe to be most reasonable. We as a council have managed to produce a balanced budget this year and are very pleased that this will mean that the council tax element for MDC will not increase this year.

Planning matters take up most of my time and we receive a large number of applications each week. I am told that this is lower than usual due to the economic situation, so in some ways, I am not looking forward to the recovery! On many occasions we are called out to look at specific sites for all sorts of matters, from a small domestic extension to huge schemes like the hospital and major proposed housing & retail projects. This can be most interesting and it shows that the future for the district is sound and vibrant. I have a personal policy to step back from planning matters regarding this village as we are obliged to deal with applications in committee without any predisposition or predetermination. I therefore tend to follow the recommendations of the parish council unless there are extraordinary reasons due to details that may not have been in the public domain previously, this is very rare though.

In conclusion, I have had a most enjoyable first year as District Councillor and am looking forward to the challenges facing us in the coming year. I thank parishioners for their support in what are difficult times for a lot of people. As district councillor, I do not have a magic wand to get some things done, but I will always try to represent the village and the other villages in the ward to my best ability. My contact details are available to everyone on the new MDC website and I am always very happy to take telephone calls or meet personally if someone has a particular issue. As time goes by, I am getting to meet and work with an increasing number of the council officers and it is getting easier to find the right person for the job. I am also willing to discuss planning matters, however I may give advice but will not saywhether I would support the application or otherwise as this would indicate bias.

I think that we are all going to see quite a few changes to the way local government impacts on the daily lives of parishioners as the governments new laws filter down from Westminster. On the subject of Westminster, I have to acknowledge the assistance I have received from Priti Patel MP on several occasions. She has on more than one occasion worked with me to get a good result for a couple of long standing problems in the village. As your MP, she works very hard and should anyone have any matters that they would like raised with her, either do so through me, or to her parliamentary email address. She tells me that she receives on average 3500 per day, so I am grateful that I only receive a couple of dozen daily in respect of Maldon Council.

The weather was a little kinder to us in 2011 than in 2010 and it is fair to say that the committee feared that it would be more difficult attracting stall holders following the semi washout of the previous year. However the team managed to get a record number of stalls last year and it was really nice to see a few different things. We were particularly pleased to get The Essex Smallholders Association, who bought along a variety of animals which proved to be very popular with everyone, particularly the children. There was plenty to see and do, with the old favourites of the gun dog display provided by The Woodham Walter Shoot and the falconry display. We are also lucky that there is a band of ever willing volunteers on the weekend itself, who give up their time to put up tents and generally help with the preparations. We have now established a fund that can cover us in the event of a total loss due to bad weather etc so it has been decided not to take this grant in 2012.

Footpath Officer - Peter Warren



I've now completed 5 years as Parish Footpath Officer and still enjoy making sure our public rights of way are clear and safe to walk. I get good support from Nicky Coleman (the ECC Public Rights of Way Officer for Mid-Essex), also our farmers and landowners, not to mention the unknown villagers who like to do a bit of pruning on their walks. For example, I might notice that an overhanging branch is becoming a danger. When I return a few days later armed with a saw I find that some kind person has already dealt with it!

All of our paths have remained walkable throughout the past year. With a lot of growth early in the season, ECC were persuaded to bring forward their cutting schedule for Woodham Walter from mid-August to late May. They then did a second cut for a few paths in September. During the past year there have only been 6 incidents with trees blocking paths, the worst being a large

elm falling across FP19 plus the power lines (and my garden!) putting the village in darkness for the evening! Also on FP19, the many barrow loads of stones, kindly dumped by the allotmenteers, seems to have solved the problem of the muddy area by the stream.

Most of the improvements to our paths in the past year have been to the bridges. There are 22 footbridges in the parish (I think!) and the 14 wooden ones can get very slippery in winter with leaves, algae, frost etc. Despite the financial cutbacks, in the past year ECC have either widened or completely replaced 8 bridges, surfaced them with the yellow anti-slip strips and in some cases added handrails. Additionally at least ten new waymark posts have been erected and literally dozens of waymark discs nailed up, or old ones replaced.

On the downside I'm afraid there has been some vandalism. Last May Chris Wheadon and I erected 3 new waymark posts on a bridleway in Woodham Walter Common. Within 3 months two of them had completely disappeared. On FP14 running from the church to The Wilderness, a new handrail was been added to the bridge over the stream. Within 9 months this has been sabotaged twice by loosening or removing the grub screws holding it together. Also there have been several instances of waymark discs being prised off or damaged. Usually this is down to squirrels, woodpeckers or horses, not humans! Please help me to keep our paths in good shape. Keep up the pruning and if you are out walking and see anything that needs attention or any improvement that you could suggest please let me know.

The past year saw several changes within the Diocese. The Bishop of Bradwell, the Rt Revd Dr Laurie Green retired and was replaced by The Venerable John Wraw (Archdeacon of Wiltshire) and in Chelmsford a new Bishop, Stephen Cottrell, was installed. A group from St Michael's joined over 2,700 people at St Paul's Cathedral to witness the consecration of John Wraw. Many of us have also had the opportunity of meeting Bishop Stephen.

St Michael's commitment to the village school is a priority. Revd Stephanie, together with two church representatives on the school governing body and lay people from the parish, have made their own contribution to spiritual awareness within the school. A successful Diocesan Inspection early in the New Year reflected that commitment. We hold regular assemblies both in school and at church, together with weekly JAM Club and a monthly KidsJAM held in the Women's Club Room on Sunday mornings to which all children are warmly invited. Revd Stephanie has also visited Tadpoles Nursery.

The Diocesan led link with Kenya entered a new stage with the village school securing a grant to enable the continuation of exchange visits, together with strengthening links and understanding through education. We were pleased to be part of the visit paid last summer by Mary Wanjiku and David Njanja.



Our service to the community included two weddings, five funerals, three crematorium services and five baptisms. We have also celebrated the Confirmation of a young member of our church. The Outreach project with the travelling community continued, as has a fortnightly prayer group and pastoral visiting. Courses in a range of Christian studies take place at The Rectory catering for all age groups. Revd Stephanie is also available at The Rectory on Tuesdays between 10am and 11am for all parish related enquiries.

Weekly services continue in the usual format of Holy Communion on the first and third Sundays, alternated with Morning Prayer and Family Service. On the occasional fifth Sunday we enjoy a joint service of Holy Communion with our sister church, St Margaret's. Music plays an important part in our worship and we are immensely grateful to our organist and members of the choir for their dedication and enthusiasm.

We play an active role in the village, through involvement in the village weekend in July and Bell Meadow Day in August. Other charitable fund raising includes Ride and Stride in aid of Essex Churches, The Children's Society, The Royal British Legion, the Kenyan Link and various cancer charities amongst others.

The Flower Festival continues to be a main fundraiser for which we gratefully acknowledge the dedicated efforts of so many people, resulting in a significant sum raised for kitchen and toilet facilities. The theme last year was "Celebrations" running over four days in July. The festival is proving popular with groups of visitors such as Ramblers and local history groups, who enjoy architectural and historical talks as well as the delicious ploughman's lunch and cakes provided by the Women's Club.

All work necessary to keep the church and land in good repair is undertaken voluntarily where possible and for this we are indebted not only to our congregation but also to The Friends of St Michael's. Please refer to The Friends' contribution to this Annual Report for their latest achievements. This year some of the yew trees have been lopped in an effort to halt their decline, and it is hoped that this work will be effective in promoting new growth. Metal theft is a continual danger and we do ask everyone to be vigilant. Insurers will now only cover costs up to £5,000 that in many cases is insufficient to cover the cost of damage caused and the parish must then provide the difference.

St Michael's Church

Following the appointment of a Fabric Officer and a new architect, we are looking forward to progress on long awaited projects. A dedicated electrical supply has been installed in readiness for the new kitchen area and we are looking forward to repairs starting on the south and west walls, the re-opening of the south door and access for the disabled.

The Robert Henry Faulkner Almshouses are in good repair thanks to the efforts of the Honorary Clerk Malcolm Bunn and his wife Iris. Last year saw the replacement of front hedges and fences.



We are custodians of a beautiful Elizabethan church and financial wornes are never far away. We are very grateful for the support we already receive but costs for the upkeep of the fabric continually drain our resources and if the time comes when this is no longer viable we will

have a 'dark church' — a locked empty shell. If we wish to retain our church, we should all see it as our responsibility to ensure it survives. There is no price for admission and it is available as a quiet pastoral centre at all times not just for weddings, baptisms and funerals. St Michael's does not have the look of a church in despair. It is a thriving place, providing a welcome to everyone both in good times and bad. So please continue to help us, in any way you feel able, to maintain the spiritual heart of Woodham Walter.

The Friends of St. Michael's Church have had another very successful year. Our membership currently stands at 133 and these Friends supply us with very valuable support in a number of important ways. Members provide us with manpower to assist with working parties, they provide professional support with their knowledge and skills, they support fundraising activities and critically they provide us with direct financial support.



As normal this year we have run a number of working parties to maintain the church grounds; during the last of these a number of hardworking friends succeeded in filling sixteen one ton builders bags with leaves and other plant material that was cleared from the churchyard.

We have funded specialist repairs to the supports to the stained glass windows and repairs to the guttering and down-pipes.

Other actions include management of the churchyard to develop an ecologically sound and attractive environment, work on the yew trees, restoration work on some Victorian grave markers, the installation of electric heaters and the design of a fireproof box for the electrical switch panel.

We ran fund raising activities at both the Flower Festival and at the Bell Meadow Rural Celebration; many thanks go to the Friends who organised and manned those stands. We have achieved a lot in the few years that we have been in existence but there is a lot more to do. One of the critical outstanding tasks is extensive building work that will be necessary to resolve damp problems in the south and west walls of the church.

The Friends are a non-religious group established solely to ensure that the fabric of the church and its grounds are appropriately maintained and we are always seeking new members. The site remains settled, as we have only recorded two changes in residents throughout the year, although their individual stand-

ings have changed, as the Mobile Homes Act now includes Local Authority Gypsy/Traveller sites, hence giving the residents rights akin to tenancies. The weather has been kind to us this year, with the snow short lived, hence not finding the site temporarily cut off as in previous years. Government funding has been less kind, with cuts and changes in access to grant funding; we have been unable to apply for the key refurbishment grants to keep the site at its best. However the site management team continue to do their best to maintain the site for all key functions.

In my previous report, I mentioned that our service was under review. Things have moved on considerably since then, and we will be expanding the service via a partnership approach to the "Essex Countywide Traveller Unit", which in addition to the existing site management responsibilities, will be promoting health, education and fire safety across all sites in Essex, and managing unauthorised encampment on the same basis. I will provide more information on this to the parish when we get closer to launch.



General

I am pleased to report there have been no major issues on the Common apart from damage by Deer. (Highlighted later in this Report)

Working parties have undertaken normal annual maintenance concentrating on removal of bramble and bracken from both bog areas downstream of Pheasanthouse Farm. This work is ongoing. Work has also included the continued annual removal of the invasive species Himalayan Balsam. This particular work is wholly undertaken in the bed of the stream near Twitty Fee. This work is ongoing.

Removal of bracken from the newly created Heather area has been undertaken successfully and will continue as and when necessary.

A number of fallen/rotten trees have been felled/made safe. This work is ongoing.

Projects

- (1) Water Level Monitoring. This is ongoing; water levels in bog areas are still visually reasonable despite below average rainfall.
- (2) Heath land Regeneration. The upland area of 1/3 acre (0.15 ha) has new successful heather growth. Another larger area of approx 1 acre (0.50 ha) has now been cleared ready for seeding shortly.
- (3) Bridleways/Footpaths. Two Waymark posts have been mysteriously removed it is anticipated that they will be replaced in the near future. Following a Horse rider/cyclist accident new signs have been erected at main entrances requesting mutual respect for all users

Encroachment on Badger Set . Following my persistent use of felled Holly, cyclists have now desisted from cycling near the Set.


Additional Matters

Deer Management

- (1) Following agreement with adjoining landowners a Deer Management Plan is soon to be implemented. It has been established that increasing Deer numbers are causing considerable damage to newly coppiced areas. Such damage if allowed to continue, adversely affects woodland regeneration. As Woodland regeneration is one of our objectives, it is important to address the problem.
- (2) The "Steep Slope" sign has been damaged I have already re erected it twice. This damage may be linked with the disappearance of the Waymark signs mentioned earlier in the Report.
- (3) A small bridge near "Twitty Fee" needs attention, this repair work will be undertaken by a Working party in April.
- (4) Leanne Sergeant (Reserves Manager) has now taken up another Post within the Trust, and has been succeeded by Adam Rochester (as of 1st February 2012)

At present we operate 10 sessions a week, which includes two all day sessions, and there is always lots going on, regular visits to the allotment, walks around the village, visits to our friends at school and visits to us from others in the community, If you would like to visit please just call Pam 01245 222046, we would love to see you!



Neighbourhood Watch - Brian Cumming



We have had a fairly quiet 12 months; some relatively minor crime but nothing serious and significantly less than surrounding areas. Incidents have included a house burglary, a break-in and theft from a garage, a vehicle theft, the theft of a vehicle catalyst, the theft of a garden ornament and an act of vandalism to an agricultural vehicle. Not major

crimes but disturbing for those involved and potentially something that we could deter by remaining vigilant.

During the year I have attended a number of area coordinator meetings in Maldon and I have communicated advice derived from these meetings via articles in the Parish magazine. I regularly receive crime reports from Maldon Police and, again, I pass on any relevant information and advice through the magazine.

An issue that has grown this year is the number of phone, post and internet scams that we are subject to; I have written on this subject a number of times and highlighted some of the methods used by the scammers. My advice on this subject is to treat any approach by a stranger as suspicious, no matter how plausible and never give away any personal information. Also if something seems too good to be true, it almost certainly is!

As always I encourage everyone to remain aware of those around the village and to alert the police immediately (using 999) if they believe that there is something suspicious going on. The great majority of crime in the Maldon area is opportunistic and simply ensuring that our homes and vehicles are secure would help greatly in reducing such problems.



Community Speed Watch

The aim of the Community Speed Watch initiative is to address the problem of either real or perceived speeding. This is done in partnership with the community and police.

Woodham Walter Parish Council support the scheme and organise Community Speed Watch members who are not Police or County Council employees but members of the local community who want to make a real difference to the speed of vehicles through the village. Using a hand-held radar gun, they capture the speed of offending vehicles, record the necessary data and send it to the

police. This information is logged on the police computer where further checks can be made into insurance, tax etc. The police then send the registered keepers a warning letter explaining the dangers and problems caused by speeding. Persistent individuals may then be targeted by the police who will prosecute them if they are caught.

In Woodham Walter during 2011 we carried out 7 sessions resulting in 43 vehicles details being forwarded to Essex Police- this included vehicles with speeds in excess of 50mph. Essex Police also carried out enforce-

ment in the village which resulted in 3 drivers sent for Speed Awareness Training, 1 fixed penalty ticket and 2 reported to court.

More volunteers are needed in Woodham Walter, the commitment required only needs to be an hour every two or three weeks. Full training will be given on how to use the detecting equipment, how to record the data, health and safety etc. If you are interested in volunteering as a CSW member please contact our Parish Clerk, Jacky Bannerman for more information.

Police - PS Phil Morley



2012 sees some major changes taking place within Essex Police as we attempt to make the vast savings that have been widely

publicised. As of the 1st of March 2012 the Maldon District will combine with Chelmsford to become one Policing area with a 24/7 Response element operating from South Woodham Ferrers.

The Neighbourhood Policing Teams will continue to operate from both Maldon and Southminster Police Stations. The 'Front Office' service at both of these Police Stations has also seen a change in the opening times. These Stations will now be open between Midday and 6 PM, Monday to Saturday and closed all day on Sundays. This is in line with other Police Stations throughout the County.

As has previously been explained the village of Woodham Walter forms part of the Purleigh Policing area in the Maldon District encompassing the villages to the South West of the area from Wickham Bishops to North Fambridge to Latchingdon.

Between the 1st of April 2011 and the 31st of December 2011 Essex Police have dealt with 79,847 crimes of

which 21,874 were detected and 2,359 were dealt with by Neighbourhood Resolution. This gives Essex Police an overall detection rate of 30.55%.

For the same period the Maldon District has seen 1,760 criminal offences reported of which some 488 were detected and a further 64 offences dealt with by way of Neighbourhood Resolution. This gives the Maldon District an overall detection rate of 31.36%, nearly 1% higher than the Force average, meaning that just fewer than 1 in 3 crimes are solved within the District. We have seen a slight increase of 25 crimes this year which equates to an increase of 0.1 offences per day. Whilst there has been an increase in crime we have also seen an increase in the number of offences detected by 34 or by 1.5%.

Although the Crime figures may have changed from the previous year unfortunately the type of crime that is being committed in our Community doesn't. We are still seeing a large number of acquisitive or opportunist crimes. These are in the main targeted at insecure vehicles and premises often with valuable items on display or left in the glove box. I would urge all local residents to ensure that all valuable items are re-

moved from vehicles and that they lock them when left no matter for how short a period of time. Garages and sheds should also be locked and secure with valuable items secured by additional means.

The 'One Place On Wheels' initiative continues to take place on a monthly basis with the Mobile police Station visiting the villages within the District. The days, times and locations have changed in some of our areas so please see below or check the One Place web site for up to date details, www.one-place.org.uk .

The coming year promises to be very busy for us with the Queens Diamond Jubilee celebrations and the Olympic Torch coming to our District, together with the numerous annual events that require a policing input.
