The past year has seen several changes within the Parish council. In August James Rushton filled the vacancy created by Gill Orford when she left earlier in the year, joining the other five councillors: Andrew Newland (Vice Chairman), Mark Durham, James Bunn, Joanna Symons and Angus Neale. Then in January, after 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ years valued service, Andrew unfortunately had to stand down due to ill health, his role as Vice Chairman being filled by Joanna. In February John

Tompkins was co-opted to fill the vacancy until the forthcoming Parish Council elections in May. Last, but definitely not least, I must mention probably the most important member of the Parish Council line up: Jacky Bannerman, the Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer. This is a very important role within our community and involves a considerable amount of work and commitment to keep on top of the constant stream of correspondence, emails and

phone calls that have to be prioritised and actioned, in addition to producing the monthly agendas and minutes as well as controlling the parish finances. There is no doubt that without Jacky the Parish Council would not be able to function effectively.

This is the sixth year that Jacky has collated this set of reports for circulation prior to our Annual Parish Meeting. These reports have made the distribution of information much easier and we now reach a far wider audience than just those who attend the annual meeting. We would however still strongly recommend parishioners to attend the annual meeting on Monday 30th March at 8pm in Woodham Walter Village Hall, Rectory Road, especially this year with the VDS Exhibition on display. Indeed we warmly welcome parishioners to all of our regular monthly meetings which are held in the Women's Club on Top Road at 8pm on the second Monday of the month. At the start of each meeting there is a public forum at which any issues concerning the village may be raised.

Funding for the Parish Council comes principally from the annual precept collected by Maldon District Council (MDC). From this money the Parish Council provides community funding to several local organisations (totalling over \pounds 1000 per annum) in addition to paying for the care and upkeep of the village (such as grass and hedge cutting, street lighting etc). As you may have noticed, this winter we've also managed to fund a major tidy-up



to the western side of Bell Meadow involving considerable tree surgery and removal of brambles. Councillors are very conscious that this money comes from each and every council tax payer in the parish and try to ensure that it is spent wisely.

One of the most important roles of the Parish Council is to be part of the consultation process for planning applications. We continue to consult neighbours on any new applications received and, after discussion at our meetings, we make our recommendations to MDC for inclusion in their deliberations. It is always helpful if the applicant is present at our meeting. We offer a public forum at the start of the meeting where representations can be made and if councillors have any

queries during our deliberations it is useful to be able to reopen the meeting to the public in order to clarify certain points.

Although we only have a limited voice it is an important one and involvement in the planning process forms an important part of our function.

In 2014-15 (to date) there were 15 planning applications to consider, of which 2 decisions were contrary to the Parish Council view. We supported 11 of the applications and raised objections to 3. Of these applications so far 11 have been approved and one refused. This year there were 4 applications for demolition, replacement or conversion of buildings, also one claim for Lawful Development, one extension, one application for an outbuilding and one application for redevelopment and internal alterations. Additionally we considered 6 applications for works to trees including TPOs. We also made representations to Essex County Council objecting to an application to upgrade FP7 (in Woodham Walter Common) to a Bridleway. The application was subsequently refused.

At the time of writing we have just received an application for a residential development comprising 11 dwellings on land adjacent to Whitegates, Herbage Park Road. Application Reference; FUL/MAL/15/00047 The Parish Council are due to discuss our response to MDC at an Extraordinary Parish Council meeting which I have called on Wednesday 18th March at 8pm in Woodham Walter Village Hall. It will be interesting to receive parishioners views on this proposed development.

For future planning and new development it is most important that the village submits a Village Design Statement (VDS) meeting the requirements of the district council as soon as possible. I would like to sincerely thank our VDS committee (David Beattie, John Tompkins, James Nolan, Ken Rennie and Keith Amato) for all of their hard work and the good progress made in order to get the VDS consultation copy onto the Parish Council website. 15th will be considered for inclusion in the final draft that will be on display in the Village Hall prior to the Annual Parish Meeting.

The VDS questionnaire return rate was in excess of 75% which reflects not only the team's commitment but also the interest

which we all have in our village's future. Analysis of the returns showed that the second highest perceived disappointment living here (after the lack of a village shop) was the number of vehicles speeding through the village. However, with the help of the Bell Meadow Legacy committee, we hope to do something about this problem. Thanks to the promise of a generous grant we are now in a position to apply for match funding which would enable us to purchase our own Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS). For the past five years we have been loaned a VAS from Essex County Council for a few weeks at a time positioned on Church Hill. What we would like to do is to purchase our own VAS with the facility to download the figures for analysis. Also to install one or two extra poles so that the VAS can be moved from site to site, in order to maximise its effect and hopefully reduce speeding.



At long last most of the major potholes in the village have been repaired. Throughout the year Jacky is constantly reporting problems to ECC Highways Dept and chasing up on their progress. I would urge you all to report issues yourselves as the more people that do, the more likely we are to get a solution. The annual litter pick took place in early February and a dozen helpers collected in excess of 30 black bags of rubbish. I would like to end with the traditional but heartfelt thanks to all of the other Councillors and our hard working Parish Clerk for making the job of being Chairman a lot easier.



Village Design Statement Working Group

The VDS Working Group has had a busy 11 months since the last Annual Report and is now at a stage where the draft VDS document is available for resident consultation.

In May 2014 every household in the Parish received a Questionnaire designed to assess residents' views on how they wished to see the village develop in the future. The Questionnaire covered a wide range of topics and the response to it was outstanding - in excess of 75%! Solid evidence of Parishioners great interest in the future of our village!

The Questionnaire results were collated in June and July and exhibited at Bell Meadow Day in August 2014 and simultaneously placed on the Parish Council Website. The results were subsequently used by the Working Group to dictate the format of the 'Design Statement itself and for the remainder of 2014 we set about preparing the draft, which from 1st February 2015 has been available online for residents to review.



Disproportionate New Build with Out Of Character Design.

The draft 'Statement describes the existing character and main features of design in the Village and sets out guidelines for how these should be respected in any new development. It provides an overview of the development of the Village from its inception in the Anglo Saxon period to the modern day, covering physical and human geography, infrastructure, settlement pattern and the built environment.

The guidelines, which relate to both new and existing properties, provide detailed guidance on settlement pattern, design relationships, materials, alterations and extensions, windows, roofs, boundaries, parking, lighting, street furniture and landscaping.

It is important to note that this guidance is based wholly on Questionnaire responses and therefore embodies residents' views. Its objective is to provide positive advice to householders, designers and developers on design acceptable to the community and will help to protect important or historic buildings and open spaces. Significantly, it will assist the Parish Council and District Council in determining planning applications.

Residents were able to review the draft document via the Parish Website from 1st February to 15th March 2015. Comments received have been used to refine the full document and this will be exhibited, for further resident comment, in the Village Hall from 11:00am onwards on Monday 30th March 2015. The Village Design Statement will have a significant impact on how our village changes in the future, so please come - your views are vitally important.

The VDS Public Consultation document will be exhibited at the Village Hall from **<u>11am</u> on** <u>Monday 30 March</u> when members of the VDS Working Group will be in attendance to receive comments. This will have a significant impact on the future of our Village, so your views are very important.

Parish Clerk's Report - Jacky Bannerman

It is the job of the Parish Clerk to carry out the functions and serve or issue all notifications required by law. The clerk is responsible for carrying out the decisions of the Parish Council. Woodham Walter Parish Council is involved in planning consultations, managing Bell Meadow, the care and upkeep of the village, liaising with Highways, street lighting, allotments, promoting the village and any other local issues.

During 2014/15 we provided community funding to local organisations to help with maintenance including Woodham Walter Women's Club (£147), Woodham Walter Village Hall Association (£200)and St Michael's Church (£189). We also make annual grants to Silver Threads Club (£150) and to the Essex Wildlife Trust (£105)towards their work managing Woodham Walter Common.

We also have an agreement to help pay towards the maintenance costs of the Community Playground facility at the school up to $\pounds 400$ per year. The playground is open to the community outside of school hours. There are currently plans to repair and replace a number of pieces of equipment at the playground which will necessitate the full grant being awarded again in the next financial year.



Other expenditure during the financial year has been for the works to the trees on the western side of Bell Meadow.



Parish councils are statutory bodies. Members are elected for a term of four years. The next elections are in May 2015. Watch out for details of the elections, nominations and voting on our noticeboard and website over the coming weeks.

Parish Councils are funded principally by an annual precept. Income and expenditure for the next financial year are calculated in the form of estimates. The net amount (the precept) is added to council tax, collected by Maldon District Council (the principal authority) and paid to Woodham Walter Parish Council annually. Parish councils can apply for other funding such as grant and funding awards, but they do not receive funds direct from central government, as principal authorities do.

Councillors have agreed that the precept requirement for Woodham Walter in 2015/16 will be $\pounds 10,724.00$ which works out at $\pounds 38.63$ per Band D property for the year. Woodham Walter Parish Council also receives income from the hire of the Party Tents. During the last financial year we raised £350 in hiring income. This is down on previous years so please do bear us in mind if you need a party tent, the income generated helps to keep the precept request down which benefits everyone.

Next year amongst other things, we will be paying for new football nets for the goal posts at Bell Meadow and for the re-painting of the 3 green benches in the village - so far the bench in the Memorial shelter has been completed and looks fantastic.




We have also budgeted for expenditure on producing the Village Design Statement document.



District Councillor, Mark Durham





Another year has gone by and I cannot believe that it is almost time to face an election locally and nationally. In the four years that I have been a district councillor for this ward, I have encountered many different issues and challenges. Some directly affect the parish, some the ward and a great many that impact on the district and county.

Since being elected in 2011, I have been appointed to the chair of the Community & Leisure Services Program Committee and Vice Chair of the North West Planning Committee. This increased the workload considerably, but has given me the opportunity to take key roles in several projects and initiatives for the council.

The last year at Maldon District Council has been dominated by a couple of major topics. The most important, and one that will have a wide ranging impact on every parish in the district is the submission of our Local Development Plan. The LDP sets out the planning strategy for the authority for the next 15 years and lays down the number of new houses, employment land, economic strategy, infrastructure requirements etcetera. The planning policy team have been working on this plan for the last two years, there have been two district wide consultations and several localised ones where the main developments are planned. The

council is obliged to fulfil national targets for the provision of new housing which is based on population projections from the recent census results. We have tried to keep these numbers as low as possible based on local assessments of housing need. The planned areas for expansion are identified as North Heybridge, South Maldon and Burnham. There will also be a rural allocation whereby village settlements will have to absorb approximately 420 new dwellings across the district. Preparation of this document was completed last year and then submitted to the Secretary of State. It was then allocated to The Planning Inspectorate who decide ultimately whether the plan conforms to current legislation. Part of this assessment involved an examination in public where all interested parties were invited to give evidence to an inspector. This took place in late January over a period of three weeks. The inspector heard testimony from both the council, external consultants, objectors, developers and neighbouring authorities. This is currently being analysed by the inspector who is due to tell the council whether its housing strategy is legally sound on May 8th. If this is the case, he will then go on to look at the other elements of the plan, provisionally seeking to finish in July. If the plan is sound, the council will be in a position to adopt the LDP later this year.

There are several reasons why this is crucial to every parish in the district. Until the plan is deemed sound, the council cannot demonstrate to the government that it has a suitable quantity of housing land, known as The Five Year Land Supply. In cases like this the government impose rules on the council under its National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). This clearly states that MDC is obliged to grant any application that is in a sustainable location unless there are significant reasons to refuse. The difficulty here is that sustainability is a rather undefined criteria and is interpreted in different ways by different planning inspectors. The other key point is that until the council can demonstrate it has a five year land supply, the previous village development boundaries (village envelopes) are effectively suspended. This has led to a large number of applications that the council have either been unable to refuse or refused and lost on appeal. We are hoping for a favourable verdict from the inspector on May 8th which will give us the five year land supply and provide much greater power to resist applications in areas not identified in the LDP. Unfortunately if the decision goes against us, we will be back with the NPPF rules and little chance opposing developments either large or small, rural or otherwise.

In 2014 Woodham Walter Parish Council decided to commission a Village Design Statement which is one of the initiatives under The Localism Act 2011. This lays down a guide that suggests suitable design styles for new properties and extensions in the village. This guide has to accord with the councils LDP and will be adopted at the same time. The VDS will then become a piece of the jigsaw that is used when applications are considered. Although it cannot contradict planning policies, it has some weight enabling planning officers and elected members to resist inappropriate design. The VDS is unable to influence whether the parish receives new development, but it can be used to guide the appearance and street scene. There has been a great deal of work done to compile this document and I congratulate the team on their efforts. Maldon District Council has identified Woodham Walter for the designation of a conservation area although this will be limited to The Bell, houses adjacent to the pub, the church and possibly Bell Meadow. This will give further protection to this defined

area, however I am advised that the process is unlikely to be completed this year.

The other main topic dominating the council recently has been a senior management restructure. Funding from central government is steadily being reduced to local authorities and costs savings are having to be found to balance the budget. Maldon is fortunate to have considerable reserves from the disposal of its housing stock and prudent financial management. These reserves are being steadily eroded by grant cuts and poor investment returns due to low interest rates. The management changes will give a saving of nearly £100,000 per year and make the organisation more streamlined.

My committee has also overseen a new contract for leisure centre provision in the district which involves an investment by the council of 2 million pounds but will greatly improve the standard of its facilities and generate a significant income for the authority. We have also worked on some initiatives to improve The Promenade Park in Maldon, promote tourism, reduce roadside litter and standardise parking charges in council car parks. We have also been looking at the efficiency of the waste collection contract and district recycling rates. Until February this year, Essex County Council spent £24m per year on landfill tax, which is additional to the costs of collecting and transporting the residual waste. ECC now has a brand new facility in Basildon where all residual refuse will go for processing into a renewable energy product. This means that Essex is not putting a single black bag into landfill. Our recycling targets are very strict and we receive cash credits from ECC for every tonne of recyclable material. It is essential therefore to do whatever we can to improve the district performance, which may lead to a review of collection methods at some stage in the future.

I have been working with McDonalds restaurants in the area to try to reduce the litter that comes from its outlets. Maldon District Council had some success with a scheme of tracing car owners who



DVLA due to legal constraints about evidence acquisition for the offence. Since this happened I am liaising with McDonalds to look at other initiatives to reduce roadside littering.

There is no doubt that whatever government we have in England after The General Election on May 7th, the nature of local government will change over the coming years. Central government is steadily cutting its grant funding to councils and at some stage in the future I believe that local government will have to be self sufficient from Westminster. This will necessitate alternative ways to raise the required income, such as local taxation, retention of business rates and a more commercial attitude to the use of council assets and service provision. Maldon District Council has a good level of reserves, but this will dwindle in the next three years unless further cuts can be found or new revenue streams pursued to offset funding cuts and low investment income. Our position is further helped by several years of prudent financial management and a careful spending

strategy. I would like to remind parishioners that all council meetings are open to the public and since the middle of last year, there is an audio recording which is available from the MDC website. I would recommend that people attend a meeting or two as this gives an opporhad been linked to a particular order via their receipt and the in store CCTV. Unfortunately we are now no longer able to use our web based access to the pstraints about

tunity to see how the decisions that affect everyone's lives are made. I am always available to talk to parishioners on any subject that I can help with. In many cases I am able to either take action myself, or refer questions to the department that can assist. In some cases this may mean seeking help from our Member of Parliament. I have had to do this on a number of occasions and Priti Patel MP has been very pleased to assist, often with spectacular results.

Having been born and bought up in Woodham Walter, our village is very important to me. We are fortunate to live in a community where there is more local pride and spirit than any other that I represent, possible more than any other parish in the district. I remain proud and grateful to be to contribute to the village in my roles as district councillor and hopefully I will remain to be your representative in the future.

The idea of Woodham Walter running its own Village Lunch was first suggested during 2014 and such was the enthusiasm behind the idea that the first lunch was actually served last November.

Based in the Women's Club Room, the Village Lunch has been set up by volunteers from the village and is a non profit making venture. Running on the first Monday of each month, attendees are charged *f*.6 for a two course meal. Water is provided to drink, but those who come are welcome to bring drinks, soft or alcoholic to accompany their meal. The cooking is done by Linda Hamilton who does an amazing job. Linda is supported by volunteers organised by Sally Bull, Jacky

Bannerman and Cathy Barber, who help to serve the lunch and clear away afterwards.

There were two main objectives behind the setting up of the Village Lunch. The first was to give older people the opportunity to meet up with friends and neighbours whom they may not get to see regularly either because of illness, being housebound or just having lost social contact. The second objective was to give those people an opportunity for a good quality home cooked meal in a warm and welcoming environment.

Since its launch, Village Lunch has been increasingly successful with more people attending each month. With numbers limited at 20, booking is one month ahead and we are finding that many people re-book for the next month which is great.

There is a real buzz at our lunches which is just the way it should be; lots of conversation and good food. If you know anyone, especially living in the village, who would benefit from joining our lunch then please let us know and we will make sure they have a place at our table.

Footpath Officer - Peter Warren

I'm still walking the Parish paths every day with my assistant Bella in an attempt to make sure that our public rights of way are clear and safe to walk. There are over 30 footpaths and bridleways in the Parish and I try to cover two or three each day. Ones that are close to home are checked at least once a week whereas the far-flung ones I endeavour to check every few months. Any problems that I can't fix easily are referred to the appropriate farmer or landowner, failing that the Rights of Way department of ECC Highways. Our Rights of Way Inspector there is Shirley Anglin who responds promptly to any issues that I bring to her attention.

For the third winter running many of our paths have become flooded and ended up scarcely passable due to the boggy mud. Although we enjoyed a good summer the water table still remained high and a lot of paths didn't really dry out from the previous winter. Several new springs have appeared around the parish and washing boots and hosing down the dog have become a daily occurrence almost throughout the year! Some people have suggested that we need to install decking in places but I think that the vast majority would prefer things to be left as they are, muddy or not.

Apart from mud, the perennial problems are overgrown paths and fallen trees. Last year was particularly bad for weed growth and stinging nettles. In particular FP18 through the old ruins of WW Hall became impassable, as was FP14 behind the church where walkers unfortunately resorted to walking through the crops. Most parishes must have been in a similar position as, despite repeated requests to ECC from late May onwards, the cut for our parish wasn't completed until the end of July (however the 13 paths on the schedule were eventually cut very well). Fortunately the past year was a good one for paths blocked by fallen trees with only 6 such incidents compared with four times that number the previous year.

Whilst walking the local paths I also carry out the job of Tree Officer. This is to satisfy the Parish Council's responsibility to check on the safety of trees bordering paths on WW Common, plus the trees surrounding Bell Meadow and a few others dotted around the village. In the past year only two fallen trees have required removal (one on Bell Meadow and one on BR31). I'm pleased to report that I still haven't seen any evidence of Chalara Fraxinea (Ash Dieback) in WW.

Please help me to keep our paths in good order. Take your secateurs for a walk! If you see anything that needs attention, or any improvement that you could suggest, don't hesitate to let me know and let's hope that we have another good summer to enjoy our lovely WW countryside!

made by young Charlotte Rushton were much enjoyed.

We only have a few Woodham Walter residents as members now, the mother of a resident of the village who now lives in Maldon also joins us. The availability of affordable small housing in the village means that when older people wish to downsize they have to move to Maldon.

The help of Sheila Wade from Heybridge and Ann Maxwell is invaluable. As the members become less able, the quota of helpers to members necessarily becomes higher. The volunteers who give freely of their time and car running costs is very much appreciated by the members. Over more than thirty years since I was first asked to be President of Silver Threads we saw the club grow from 21 members to 35. A carpet bowls section was formed for those more active members to enjoy and then decline and finally end as members became less able to play. The bowls carpet and bowls are now stored in the village hall, and it would be good if these could be used by village residents. It seems over those thirty years we have flourished but owing to the village demographic there are now fewer retired people who do not drive and appreciate a social meeting.

The volunteer helpers are willing to continue running the club as long as they are needed and able, but if for any reason Ann Maxwell or I were not able to drive, then the club would have to be wound up.

General.

Working Parties have undertaken hand pulling work of invasive species in the two Bogs downstream of Pheasant House Farm, due to our efforts this work is now paying dividends. The work has **substantially reduced** the amount of Bracken. <u>As a consequence the areas of rare</u> <u>Sphagnum Moss have increased</u> <u>considerably, which is rated a</u> <u>great "success."</u>

Projects

1. Water Level Monitoring.

It is now visually obvious that water levels in the Bogs have increased considerably, which is what we wanted to see. This is due in part to the past clearance of by The Trust of invasive trees/ undergrowth on the adjoining slopes. The trees/undergrowth, by utilising natural run off had been reducing the natural water flow to the Bog areas.

2.Heathland Regeneration. Both "New Heath", and "Rowan Hollow", the large heather areas, are establishing well, Rowan Hollow having been planted last year with seed from the existing established perimeter plants. However, Working Parties will still need to control invasive Bracken /Bramble and Silver Birch Saplings.

3.Bridleways/Footpaths. Replacing missing "waymarks" is an ongoing process, generally overseen by the ECC Team. For my part I undertook a visual inspection of existing bridges on the Reserve in January this year, as



part of a Health & Safety Audit, no problems were found at that time.Last Autumn a third party did undertake some clearance of undergrowth/saplings,on a particular section of Bridleway in order to better facilitate use by horse riders.

4.Mountain Biking. This activity has increased considerably, which is obvious by the effect this is having on a number of paths. Being a Common, with free Public access we can only monitor the situation, and rely on the common sense and understanding of **all** users to be mindful, careful, and respectful to anyone else enjoying the Common.

Additional Matters.

Unfortunately the small area of Orchids have not appeared again

this year, we will brush cut the area again in the Spring of 2015, if they still do not appear we may have to accept the fact that they have succumbed. It is always sad and difficult to know why certain plants succumb, with no obvious reason,despite our efforts to carefully manage the habitat. We can only hope that this can be reversed and our Spring brushcutting will encourage the plants to

recover.



Our thanks to the Bell Meadow Legacy Grant Committee who awarded the PTA £500 to begin playground improvements, allowing the loose Slate Surfacing to be removed and replaced with Brick Pavia's. The work being undertaken by Hardwicke Contractors over the summer.

The new school year started with a brand new event A Charity Golf day, held at The Warren Golf Club. Again proceeds were split between the school and Essex Air Ambulance. We had a number of teams playing and a great day and evening were had by all, raising in excess of $\pounds 500$.

October saw the return of Quiz evenings, but this time for the whole family to enjoy. With the early start and finish, plenty of craft activities for the children, and tables full of picnics, a fabulous time was had by all. We raised £265 and still got the children to bed on time.

The pamper evening was our November event. Despite a wet and cold evening people still arrived for a Pamper and shop, although this was a little quieter than last year, raising $\pounds 560$.

In December, the children once again made delicious Christmas puddings with Mr Freeman-Hacker. The puddings were delicious and sales this year made f_1 150.

2014 was brought to a close with a Christmas bake & take (including the Room of Surprises with presents for mum and dad) raising f_{520} .

By the time of going to press, we will have hosted our first 'Bake and Take' of the year, including a Room of Surprises for Mothers' Day gifts, and we are hoping for great things.

Funds raised by the PTA are used to purchase vital resources for the school including hard standing in the school playground and on-line educational resources as well as subsidising the school tracksuits and the new art club and for treats such as the Wizard of Oz Christmas Pantomime. We are planning some really exciting events for this year which we would love the community to join us so put a date in your diary for:

With the new building work completed we decided to fund the redecoration of the inside of the Church and that too has now been done; if you have not yet seen the results of this, I encourage you to take a look next time you are passing, it really does look splendid.

We recently agreed to fund repairs to the

cremated remains memorial wall and the building of an extension to the existing wall to create more space. We are also planning to pay for the main gravel path to be upgraded to the standard of the path at the Church threshold.

Neighbourhood Watch - Brian Cumming



During the year I attended a number of Neighbourhood Watch meetings in Maldon as the Woodham Walter representative, in addition to these meetings I receive regular information from the local police with summaries of crimes that have been conducted in the Maldon area. From this information I extract items that may be of relevance to us and publish related advice and guidance in the village magazine; this year I have written two such articles.

We are lucky to be living in a low crime area but the area is not entirely crime free and we all need to take sensible precautions to protect our property. We are subject to two main kinds of criminal activity, theft and phone and internet based fraud. Items under the theft category include:- House, garage and shed break-ins Items stolen from cars Purses stolen from bags in Maldon and the supermarkets And most recently, gates stolen from the school Items in the fraud category include:-Phone calls with claims to fix computer issues Emails with false information

> about tax refunds People claiming to be police or credit card officials attempting to acquire credit card details

> Emails, letters or phone calls directing people to call premium rate phone numbers

I have previously written about all of these issue and more, and the advice remains the same - keep valuables out of sight and locked away whenever possible and don't give any personal or financial details to people you don't know.

Late last year Essex police launched the 'Essex Community Messaging' system. This system gives everyone who signs up the chance to receive crime notifica-

tions and crime prevention advice via email, text or voice message from Essex Police officers, Essex Watch liaison officers and other partners including Neighbourhood Watch. I signed up for text messages and I receive two or three messages a month with useful information about current crime and safety issues. For example, one recent message provided a description of a vulnerable person who had gone missing in the local area, and it asked people to report any possible sightings.

Community Speed Watch



The aim of the Community Speed Watch initiative is to address the problem of either real or perceived speeding. This is done in partnership with the community and police.

Using a hand-held radar gun trained volunteers capture the speed of offending vehicles, record the necessary data and send it to the police. This information is logged on the police computer where further checks can be made into insurance, tax etc. The police then send the registered keepers a warning letter explaining the dangers and problems caused by speeding. Persistent individuals may then be targeted by the police who will prosecute them if they are caught.

Essex Police is currently facing significant challenges due to budget reductions which has inevitably led to a decrease in police numbers and this trend will continue over the next 2 years at least.

Because of this it is even more important than ever, that everyone continues to report anything suspicious to the police straight away, using telephone number 101 or 999 if it is an emergency. Across the rural communities Land Rovers in particular continue to be targeted by thieves. Both the whole vehicles and parts from them are being stolen. Please bear this in mind when deciding where to leave such vehicles overnight and ensure appropriate security measures are in place.

If you are the owner of an oil tank, then please also take advice from your supplier as to how to reduce the likelihood of becoming a victim of crime as this is also an offence type that is occurring regularly in the rural communities.

Woodham Walter Parish Council are currently looking into purchasing our own Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) or Speed Indicator Device (SID) for the village in order to make drivers more aware that they're exceeding the 30mph limit. We feel that this is something that would benefit all members of our community and judging by the number of comments on the returned Village Design Statement questionnaires this is something that worries a lot of villagers and urgently needs addressing.

Unfortunately this equipment is rather expensive, far too much to purchase from our reserve funds or by requesting an increase in the precept income which the Parish Council receives from Maldon District Council as part of the Council Tax system.

A simple battery powered SID (smiley face) costs in excess of \pounds 3000. Ideally what we would like to purchase is a SID Data Capture version (approx £4500). We already have one pole by Bell Meadow (this currently receives a VAS which is shared with other villages on an adhoc basis) and Essex County Council Highways would be commissioned to erect at least one additional pole in the village for us. We could then download and analyse the results so that the SID could be moved from site to site with best effect.

We have been successful in our application to the Bell Meadow Village Association for a Legacy Grant of $\pounds 2000$. There are a number of grant funding options which we are now in the process of investigating and hope to be successful in achieving the purchase of this equipment in the next year which we expect will be of great benefit to all of the village and act as a good reminder that Woodham Walter village has a 30 mph speed limit.

Woodham Walter Parish Council works hard to keep the community informed of issues and information which affects residents.


