

From the Chairman...



The composition of the Council has remained the same this year, with James Rushton (Vice Chairman) James Bunn, Mark Durham, Jenny Hughes, John Tompkins and Peter Warren.

Jacky Bannerman is the only non-volunteer member of the Parish Council team and is employed part time by Woodham Walter Parish Council. Without Jacky's immense hard

work and dedication, the Council would most definitely not be able to function effectively. Jacky has been in the role for over 10 years, in which time the workload has greatly intensified, with Jacky receiving a constant flow of emails, phone calls and correspondence, which have to be dealt with on an almost daily basis. Jacky is often the first point of contact between parishioners and the Parish Council, and her years' experience have been particularly valuable to me as a new Chair. Jacky produces the monthly agendas and minutes of the Parish Council meetings, both of which can be long and complex, and she controls the parish finances.

For several years now, Jacky has collated this annual report, consisting of individual reports from various groups and bodies within the village, which has allowed for a wider circulation of the information, other than just reaching those who are able to attend the Annual Parish Meeting.

This year's Annual Parish Meeting is on Thursday 27th April at 8pm in Woodham Walter Village Hall, and we hope very much that as many villagers as possible are able to attend, to get an update about what is going on in the village.

We also warmly welcome parishioners to all of our regular monthly meetings which are held in the Women's Club in Top Road at 8pm on the second Monday of the month. At the start of each meeting, there is a public forum at which any issues of concern within the parish may be raised.



Some of the Parish Councillors also have additional individual responsibilities within the community. Peter Warren is our Footpaths Officer, and diligently reports on any damage or problems relating to our footpaths that may need attention. James Rushton oversees the Allotments Association, and reports back at Council Meetings on any developments or problems relating to the allotments in our village. John Tompkins is a key member of the Village Design Statement (VDS) committee, and provides valuable feedback on developments and issues relating to getting the VDS finally completed and accepted by Maldon District Council. Mark Durham, as Chairman of the Bell Meadow Village Association, keeps us updated on

plans for the next Bell Meadow Day, and I am a School Governor at Woodham Walter C of E Primary School, and update councillors on school matters, and issues relating to my Governor duties.

Mark Durham is also a Maldon District Councillor, as well as being a Parish Councillor. Along with Henry Bass, they regularly attend our monthly meetings, to update Councillors on developments within the Maldon District. We also very often have Essex County Councillor, Penny Channer, at our monthly meetings, and Penny updates us on wider issues of interest in the area covered by Essex County Council. If the District or County Councillors cannot attend the Parish Council meeting in person, they send a written report instead. The attendance of these Councillors provide us with valuable information about wider local issues.

Funding for the Parish Council comes principally from the annual Precept, this being the money returned to us by Maldon District Council (MDC) from that collected via Council Tax. From this money the Parish Council pays for the care and upkeep of the village, including things such as grass and hedge cutting and street lighting etc. It also provides community funding for several local organisations. Councillors are very conscious of the fact that this money comes from every Council Tax payer in the parish and thus they ensure that the money is spent wisely and fairly. One of the most important roles of the Parish Council is to be part

of the consultation process for planning applications. We consult nearby neighbours on applications received, and after discussion at our meetings, make our recommendations to MDC for inclusion in their deliberations. Thus it is always helpful if the applicant for a planning application is present at the relevant Parish Council Meeting, where during the public forum at the start of the meeting, they can make representations about their application, and if councillors have any queries during their deliberations

on a case, they can reopen the meeting to the public, in order to clarify certain points. Although we have a somewhat limited voice, it is

nevertheless an important one, and our involvement in the planning process does form an important part of our function.

In 2016-17 there have been 16 planning applications to consider (compared with 25 in 2015-16), of which 2 decisions by the NW Planning Committee of MDC were contrary to the Parish Council view. We supported 10 applications and raised objections to 4 and made comments on 2 other applications.

Of these applications 12 have been approved and 4 refused. In the past year there has been applications for:

- 1 demolition and replacement of a building
- 1 Change of Use from office use to a dwelling house
- 2 Change of use of agricultural buildings to dwelling houses
- 3 New Outbuildings or Extensions to Outbuildings
- 3 Extensions
- 2 Extension to dwelling and new outbuilding
- 1 outline application for a new dwelling
- 1 Alterations to Listed Buildings
- 1 Renewals of Expired Consent
- 1 application for additional lodges at the holiday park.

We also responded with an objection to the major application for 140 houses just outside the village at Runsell Green which has now been refused and we have sent similar objections regarding another development of 100 houses on land east of Hyde Lane in Danbury.

The application for 11 new dwellings on land adjacent to Whitegates to the south of Bell Meadow by Warren Golf Club went to appeal after MDC objected, as did the Parish Council. The first hearing took place in February 2016, with a second hearing adjourned until June to give MDC time to study new financial docu-

ments submitted to the Inspector by the appellants. The appeal was finally dismissed by the Planning Inspector in September 2016. The Parish Council did some good work in helping this appeal to be dismissed. Councillors attended the Appeal hearings, and put forward the reasons as to why the Council was against the appeal.

The Village Design Statement (VDS) committee have expended much time, energy and hard work on finalising the Village Design Statement. The VDS was first launched publicly in August 2013, and then the following May (2014) a questionnaire was distributed to each household in the village, asking for villagers' views of design, wants and future wishes for the village. The document is very important for the parish to have more control over future planning and development in our area, and once it is endorsed by MDC, it will be a material planning consideration when determining planning applications (although this does not necessarily mean that an application contrary to the VDS will automatically be refused as each case will be determined on its own merits). I would like to sincerely thank the VDS committee for all their hard work and perseverance in order to get the document into an acceptable format to be endorsed by MDC. This process has involved several meetings with MDC planning staff, much moving of goalposts and extreme frustration! However I am hopeful that the final alterations will be acceptable by MDC, and that the

VDS will be endorsed by the Planning and Licensing Committee in June 2017. The document is well written and very readable and informative, and will be a real asset and help to those considering making a planning application.



The annual litter pick took place in the village on February 25th, and 28 bags of litter were collected by twelve volunteers. A big thank you to the people taking part on the day, and to others who regularly clean their roads throughout the year, in an attempt to keep the village looking clean an tidy.

At the moment, we have brought to the attention of the Highways Department, the muddy conditions left after repairs to a broken drain were carried out several weeks ago on Little Baddow Road/Church Hill in Woodham Walter. We were delighted to see that these works had finally taken place, and had hoped that the problems to drainage would be alleviated, but the condition that the verge was left in after repairs, was very poor – this also forms part of the Memorial Garden. We are hopeful that the dips made will be repaired and that grass seed will be sowed in the near future.

We are currently putting together an application to extend the Zig Zag lines opposite the Top Road junction, to improve road safety for motorists and pedestrians. The junction at Top Road and The Street has been a cause for concern for some years, but with increased pupil numbers at the primary school this junction has become even more congested and dangerous, especially at school drop off and collection times. This location is ideal for Zig Zag lines especially as Tadpoles Nursery now occupy the Old Chapel Stores building. We have circulated a petition for this application amongst parents and carers at the school who have offered their support, and would welcome support from anyone in the community, who feels strongly about this. The Woodham Walter Broadband Group was set up in September last year, and has already met several times. The intention of the group is to keep villagers informed of developments (or lack of them!) in getting reasonable broadband speeds to all of the

village. A Woodham Walter Broadband Parish update was sent to all properties in the village recently, explaining that the Parish Council have long recognised the importance of this, and have lobbied the organisation tasked by the County Council to allocate funding available. The result is that some, but not all, of the village will probably get reasonable broadband by the end of this Summer (2017), but at least 75 out of the approximately 275 properties in the parish, are not in any planned scheme to improve their broadband in the near future. The Group will continue to meet and to lobby for greater coverage, as good broadband now is often referred to as the '4th utility', and the lack of good broadband speeds could in the worst case scenario, prevent a house from selling or affect its price.



A really successful Street Party was held on Sunday 12th June 2016 in Top Road to celebrate the Queen's 90th Birthday. Many villagers attended, and the Queen herself would have been impressed by the turnout and all the lovely sandwiches and cakes provided, despite the less than wonderful weather. Councillors are keen to preserve village history for future genera-

tions, and it is hoped that papers relating to various groups in the village, including the Parish Council itself, the Women's Club, Village Hall committee etc. will be able to be kept together in appropriate conditions in a suitable place. Possible storage in a room in the village hall is currently being investigated.

Many villagers are keen that the telephone kiosk outside Tadpoles Nursery should be preserved, as it is an iconic piece of the village scene. Several suggestions have been made about its future usage, including having a defibrillator kept in it for village use, and also for the storage of books for borrowing. Please let us have your ideas for consideration.

I would like to end with genuine thanks to all the hard work undertaken by the other councillors, and of course, by our excellent Parish Clerk, who all help to make the job of being Chairman that much easier. I look forward to continuing working with you all in the year to come.

Village Design Statement 2016

Following extensive consultation with residents and Maldon District Council (MDC) from mid 2015 onwards, the final draft of the Woodham Walter Village Design Statement was approved by the Parish Council at their May 2016 Meeting and submitted later that month to the District Council for approval by the Planning and Licensing Committee (P and LC).

What has followed has been a particularly frustrating year for the VDS Working Group, with on-going delays to the approval of our VDS caused by the District Council changing it's requirements (none of which related to changes in legislation or the planning environment) and failing to communicate.

Additional delay has been caused by the need to incorporate an approved Conservation Area into the VDS, the approval of which was itself delayed until recently by the District Council. The Conservation Area was finally approved at the March 2017 P and LC Meeting. The VDS was on the Agenda for this meeting but it was deferred by the Committee because yet further amendments were, at the last moment, required by MDC. Once again they had changed their minds!

The points raised were promptly addressed by the Working Group assisted by the Parish Council. Despite promises of a prompt response given by our District Councillor and County Councillor and an intimation that the VDS would be on the April 2017 P and LC Meeting Agenda, MDC remained silent until it was too late to include on the agenda for this meeting. We now have a response from MDC and hope to

be meeting them as soon as possible.

We have been informed that the VDS might be on the agenda for the June 2017 P and LC Meeting, but please do not hold your breath!

In the hope that one day our VDS might eventually be approved, it will become a material consideration to the Local Development Plan and will, amongst other things, greatly assist the District Council and Parish Council in determining planning applications.

The Working Group is doing it's utmost to get our VDS approved and will keep everyone informed of progress via the Parish Website www.essexinfo.net/woodhamwalter-pc and the Parish Magazine.

includes Bell Meadow, some grass verges, the street lighting plus any other local issues. It is the job of the Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer to carry out the functions, serve or issue all notifications required by law and carry out the decisions of the Parish Council.

During 2016/17 we provided community funding to local organisations to help with maintenance including Women's Club (£163), Village Hall Association (£220) and St Michael's Church (£208). We also make an annual grant to the Essex Wildlife Trust (£115) towards their work managing Woodham Walter Common. The Street Party in June cost £298.63 which was a great community occasion and I'm sure will be repeated again one day.

We have an agreement to pay towards the maintenance costs of the Community Playground at the school up to £400 per year. Last year this money was carried over to this financial year as the school are expecting a number of repairs and replacements very soon. The playground equipment is open to the community outside of school hours, at weekends and during school holidays. Please remember that this does not include the playing field or any other areas

within the school grounds. We are currently trying to find a way of ensuring that the school remains secure and it is likely that the gate will be locked during the Winter at 4.30pm and during the Summer at 6.00pm. We are working with the school to find a suitable way of achieving this. If there are any volunteers who would like to take on the role of locking/unlocking the gate we would be glad to hear from you.



Parish Councils are funded principally by an annual precept. This is added to the council tax collected by MDC and paid to the Parish Council annually. We also receive income from the hire of the Party Tents. Last year this raised £700. Councillors have agreed that the precept requirement for Woodham Walter in 2017/18 will be £14,183.00 which works out at £52.22 per Band D property for the year.

All Parish Council's have to adhere to the Transparency Code and the information required is available on the Parish Council website so that that parishioners can view relevant documents in order to increase democratic accountability. We received a grant towards the costs of setting this up and purchasing a new laptop and scanner. So have a look at the Parish Council website and see what you think! www.essexinfo.net/ woodhamwalter-pc

We have budgeted for expenditure on producing the Village Design Statement, a contingency fund for a Speed Indicator Device and for the proposed storage of documents at the Village Hall. We also have a budget for a new gate at the top of Bell Meadow and funding for some new party tent bags.

The clerk position is a paid one which I have been doing for just over 10 years. I enjoy this community role which is not without its challenges on occasions but I try to keep everything and everyone in order as much as possible!





District Councillor—Henry Bass





The ward of Wickham Bishops & The Woodhams which encompasses Woodham Walter is represented by two District Councillors, Mark Durham and myself, Henry Bass. Under normal circumstances Mark would compile this report, but due to the forthcoming election for Essex County Council and restrictions of the purdah period, it falls to me to write this year's report to the parish council as Mark is a candidate in a neighbouring division.

In the last twelve months, several significant things have happened at Maldon District Council. In June 2016, the system of waste collection was changed to alternate weekly collection. This is rapidly becoming the most common method across the UK as it has significant economic benefits and the recycling rates are greatly improved. Since the changeover, Maldon's recycling rate has reached nearly 58% and we are hopeful that it will get close to 60% which is

an excellent result for our collection regime. Another benefit of making householders think more carefully about their refuse is that the total amount of collected waste has dropped by 700 tonnes. This is clearly a significant benefit to the environment and cost saving to the authority.

The green waste collection is extremely popular and it gives residents the opportunity to have their garden waste removed for a very cheap cost. Green bins are still available and if anyone wants to subscribe to this service, please contact the council switchboard.

The new refuse vehicles have state of the art GPS tracking and 360 degree cameras which record the entire round. This can even be accessed live by the depot if problems are reported. Certainly the number of alleged missed collection complaints has drastically reduced when residents found out that the contractor has video evidence!

The Local Development Plan has occupied a great deal of time and resource at the council over the last three years. The LDP lays out the housing requirements for the district over the next 15 years as well as things like employment land, gypsy & traveller provision and infrastructure. Due to a previous issue with a planning inspector, the LDP was referred to The Secretary of State in early 2016. This effec-

tively means that the plan is no longer under the control of the district council. The Secretary of State appointed a new inspector to examine the plan and the public hearings were completed this January. It is hoped that subject to some modification, the plan may be agreed by late summer. This will give the council much greater control over the size and location of developments in the district. However, many people will have seen the government's intention to increase house building and political pressure is being felt across the country to increase the number of new houses and the speed of development. The government is now requiring local authorities to review their plans every five years which in itself places further resource pressures on local councils.

Local government finance is also a major concern at the moment. Since the last reorganisation of local government in 1974, councils have received the money they need to provide services from taxes (council tax or rates) and a grant from central government. Since the austerity measures came into force in 2007/8 the government have reduced the amount of grant year on year. To date MDC receives less than 50% of the grant it has been paid since then and in 2015 it was announced that the grant will be completely removed by 2020.

District Councillor—Henry Bass

This would be replaced by a system of business rate retention which would be kept by local government rather than passed to the treasury. At the moment we have not been told how this will work or how the money will be distributed between the County Council and Districts, but it is fairly certain that the overall amount of money won't increase, so councils are having to look at being more commercial and find ways to generate the funds that it needs to maintain services to the community.

From my attendance at Parish Council meetings, I am aware of two key issues for Woodham Walter. High speed broadband is one of the topics that frequently comes up at parish meetings and the rural parishes seem to suffer more than most. Essex County Council are working in conjunction with BT and other broadband providers under the banner of Superfast Essex. A great deal of progress has been

made across the county, but clearly Woodham Walter is yet to benefit from this. The ducting has recently been laid into the village which will take the fibre optic cable to one of the exchange boxes in the village. This should be onstream this summer and other parts of the village should follow next year.

The other issue is the Village Design Statement that the parish have been working on for some time. It is important to understand that this document, although locally produced must comply with national policy, district policy and other documents such as The Maldon District Design Guide. National planning policy is also subject to change and a recent government white paper has outlined some possible alterations. In addition the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) is also about to be amended which could have implications for the LDP and Woodham Walter VDS. At this time, the VDS is being

assessed by council planning officers to ensure that it is satisfactory and policy compliant. Once this is done, it should be endorsed by the council by the summer.

Part of the village has already been designated as a Conservation Area. This means that dwellings in this area have certain restrictions placed on them regarding how they can be changed. For example, windows cannot be changed from timber to UPVC etc. This ensures that the character of the heart of the village is protected.

Both Mark and myself are always available should parishioners have issues that they want addressed. There are of course some things that are out of our control, but we are often able to forward such matters to whichever organisation can help. The brassicas have been good so far this winter and we are looking forward to eating those cabbages and purple sprouting that are still in the ground and looking very healthy and unpecked by the pigeons! Footpath Officer - Peter Warren



I've now been walking the Parish paths virtually every day for the past 10 years with my elderly assistant Bella and still enjoy making sure that our public rights of way are clear and safe to walk. There are over 30 footpaths and bridleways in the Parish and I try to cover two or three each day. Ones that are close to home are checked at least once a week whereas the ones further away I endeavour to check every few months. Any problems that I can't fix easily are referred to the appropriate farmer or landowner and failing that, the Rights of Way department of ECC Highways. Unfortunately we no longer have a Rights of Way Inspector for this area so there is no longer a direct contact at ECC and any problems have to be logged onto the ECC Highways online reporting system. Progressing a problem can sometimes be frustratingly slow, on the other hand some landowners get fallen trees removed the next day!

In the past year wind and storms have caused 16 trees to fall blocking footpaths and bridleways. Thanks to cooperative landowners most were removed and the path cleared within a few days. Another problem, following the warm and wet weather in May and June, was the prolific weed growth, particularly nettles. Footpath 18

through the old ruins of WW Hall became impassable, and a couple of cross-field paths were blocked by the tall oilseed rape closing in. All parishes were in a similar position and we had to wait until early August for ECC contractors Ringway Jacobs to carry out the annual cut, all 13 paths on the schedule being cut very well. Then thanks to some decent weather last summer and a beautiful sunny autumn followed by a fairly dry winter all of our paths have remained walkable for the reminder of the past year.



The only other problem was the collapse of a rotten bridge where the church path (footpath 14) crosses the stream in The Wilderness. After reporting on the online system this was promptly replaced by ECC contractors (see photos for before and after).

Whilst walking the local paths I also carry out the job of Tree Officer. This is to satisfy the Parish Council's responsibility to check on the safety of trees bordering the paths on WW Common, plus the trees surrounding Bell Meadow and others dotted around the village. In the past year six trees have required removal (one had fallen on Bell Meadow and one on WW Common plus four rotten and unsafe on bridleway 31).



Please help me to keep our paths in good order. Take your secateurs for a walk! If you see anything that needs attention, or any improvements that you could suggest, don't hesitate to let me know and let's hope that we have another good summer to enjoy our lovely WW countryside!

The church and the community owe Kathy and Arthur a great debt of gratitude for their many years of untiring commitment and dedication and the Annual Report provides an opportunity to express publicly my sincere thanks on behalf of us all for everything they have done to support St Michael's.

The task ahead seemed quite daunting but with a very active and supportive Parochial Church Council together with the wider congregation, the various functions and tasks that keep the church running were divided among the members of the PCC with Geoff Hicks taking on the role as Lay Chair.

Throughout the Interregnum St Michael's has continued to function as you would expect with Holy Communion Services, Morning Prayer and Family Services taking place without any interruption. In this we have been greatly assisted by Rev'd Canon Dr Graham Blyth, Rev'd Ken Dunston, Rev'd Lionel Webber and Rev'd Mary Cottee and others.

I have never thought of Priests being like buses but then three came along at virtually the same time. Canon Stephen Carter, the priest at All Saints Church in Maldon, stepped forward as Priest-in-Charge and Julie Willmot as Assistant Curate and they were both formally licensed on 4th September 2016 at St Michael's. PATHS:-

Bridleways/Footpaths have remained in reasonable condition, although high winds have resulted in some tree casualties which have obstructed one main path and one minor one. (Neither of these are officially designated Bridleways or Footpaths.) So we have indeed been fortunate. We had cleared the main path, and removed the obstruction on the minor path, unfortunately two days later another tree was blown over across the same minor path!. A short detour around the fallen tree has been created, so the path is still operational. The offending tree will be chain sawed when time /resources are available!.



BOGS:-

Both the "Bogs" on the Common have fared surprisingly well considering the very dry weather in the Summer, and continue to look very healthy. The regular pulling of invasive bracken is having the desired effect, so the Ferns are thriving and increasing in number. The rare Sphagnum Moss area is also gradually increasing in size on both sites, which is very encouraging.



HEATHS:-

"New Heath " The Heath is looking remarkable, the Heather has established very quickly and looked wonderful when in full bloom, a real picture, well worth a visit a great success. Small self seeded Birch saplings cause a problem, so we remove them by hand. However, we have now ring barked of nearby mature Silver Birch trees, they will eventually succumb, thus reducing the amount of Birch seeding in the Heather area.

"Rowan Hollow". We are systematically digging out the larger invasive brush and have used it to create a brushwood "fence" alongside the adjoining Bridleway on the Western edge. The area is now signed as a "Nature Reserve". We have continued to brush cut the area .Heather is now establishing very slowly. It

may be that we have to isolate one area at a time in order to achieve our ultimate objective which is to remove unwanted invasive plant species.

HIMALAYAN BALSAM:-

The amount of Balsam on the Woodham Walter section of watercourse near "Robins Nest" was very small this year, thanks to vigorous hand pulling and removal over the past two years by Working Parties. This meant that over a period of two days greatly assisted my wife (Senior Volunteer and great support)), we managed to remove virtually 100% of the plants we could see. The odd plant will always remain, however I consider that we are now successfully managing the issue, and could in time eradicate it completely from the Woodham Walter Common watercourse section.

CURRENT PROJECTS:-Creation of "Wildlife Corridors"

We have started to widen sections of Bridleway which have become restricted in width. This is a very labour intensive activity, sometimes involving lopping/sawing and in some cases removal of saplings/ small trees using heavy hand winches. I am pleased to say The Trust, which is always exploring more effective and efficient ways of Habitat Management, has now invested in some new innovative small tree/sapling pulling tools which are proving very effective and easier to use.

Neighbourhood Watch - Brian Cumming



During the year I attended a number of Neighbourhood Watch meetings in Maldon as the Woodham Walter representative.

Maldon is a low crime area and here in Woodham Walter we are fortunate enough to have even lower crime rates than Maldon. However, this is not a crime-free area and we do need to maintain vigilance.

Over the year we have seen thefts from outbuilding and thefts of heating oil, and I (and others) still regularly receive calls from individuals who wish to 'help' me to sort out problems with my computer. I have written many times about threats from cold callers and the internet and this does seem to be the main potential source of problems for us.

I used to get regular crime reports from Maldon Police and these were a good source of information on current issues and things to watch out for. However these reports became infrequent and were not always timely. In recent years the Essex Community Messaging service has been a much more effective source of information; it is convenient to use and available to all; please take a look at their website at

www.essexcommunitymessaging. org. You can select the types of information that you wish to receive and how that information will be sent to you. It is a very good way for the police to spread information quickly around the community and support crime prevention activity. For example; if a person or a vehicle is reported to have been seen behaving in a suspicious manner then an alert can be swiftly circulated increasing awareness and raising the chances of the police being able to successfully intervene. I would recommend members of our local community signing up for this service; it is free, you can select relevant information, you don't get bombarded with junk mail and it just might lead to someone getting their comeuppance! Finally, as always, please keep your eyes and ears open and your mobile phone handy; ring the police straight away using 999 if you suspect something criminal is happening.



Community Speed Watch



In Woodham Walter we are part of the Community Speed Watch initiative where members of the community join together with the support of Essex Police, Essex County Fire & Rescue Service and the Safer Essex Roads Partnership to monitor speeds of vehicles using a speed detection device. Vehicles exceeding the speed limit are referred to the Police with the aim of educating drivers to reduce their speeds through our village.

The scheme aims to cater for the problem of real or perceived speed related offending, and through partnership with the community it is used in order to:

- Reduce death and injury on the roads
- Improve the quality of life for local communities
- Reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
- Increase public awareness of inappropriate speed

Our speed detection equipment has recently been recalibrated and we now plan to start doing some more sessions in the village.

Parish Clerk Jacky who coordinates the scheme in Woodham Walter, recently attended a meeting at the Essex Fire and Rescue centre in Kelvedon. There was lots of positive information including the fact that the project is receiving relevant priority from Essex Police and the EFRS have now joined forces to help administer the scheme. The Parish Council is still pursuing the application for a Speed Indicator Device for the village and hope that this can be achieved some time this year.

30mph Wheelie Bin Stickers

These stickers have been supplied by Woodham Walter Parish Council. Discussion concluded that although on the one hand a proliferation of signs would not improve the design aspect of the village and could be considered to be unsightly, this is outweighed by the perceived benefits. It is acknowledged that to have best effect the bins should not be left out

Research shows that the stickers are most effective when they appear occasionally – i.e. in

Woodham Walter they should appear for 1 day a fortnight if they are on the black wheelie bins or 1 day a week if they are on the green bins.

They are for properties in the 30mph zone: Rectory Road, The Street, Herbage Park Road, Oak Farm Road, Little Baddow Road.

The stickers will be available for collection at the Annual Parish Meeting or by emailing the parish clerk.

Community Agent - Jan Hawkins



Supporting independent living

Community Agents provide support to vulnerable older people and their informal carers within their own communities. It is an Essex-wide project with a dedicated Community Agent covering Woodham Walter.

Many of the people that Community Agents help are seeking information and advice. Others want to know how to maximise their income or assistance with continuing to live independently. Most enquiries come from the 75-84 age group.

With the support of Community Agents more than 94% of the people who contacted them in the past year are still living independently in their own homes.

This valuable community project is being delivered in a partnership between Essex County Council, the Rural Community Council of Essex (RCCE), British Red Cross, Age UK Essex and Neighbourhood Watch Essex (NhWE). Community Agents is a FREE service. It is effective and responsive, with initial visits normally arranged within two working days of first enquiry.

Agents are local people who are easy to talk to and a fountain of knowledge about how to access services/benefits, and local clubs and groups to help combat feelings of loneliness.

Community Agents can provide information on things like community transport, emergency care planning and benefits. They can also arrange for home adaptations such as grab rails in bathrooms/bedrooms, handrails for the staircase, MESSAGE IN A BOTTLE containing all emergency information in case of illness, and much more advice and support about clubs and organisations that can help connect people back into their local communities.

Income from the party tents forms an important part of Parish Council funding. Last year we raised £700 in hiring income.

Broadband

Last year the Parish Council decided to form a Broadband Working Group, the aim of which is to explore all options for Broadband service improvement in the Village.

To date there have been two meetings where various options were reviewed and the decision taken to distribute an update leaflet which was delivered in January 2017

The current position is that things should be a lot clearer by the end of this summer when we will know the true impact of the Superfast Essex backed scheme (scheduled for completion in June/July 2017) to bring faster speeds to the centre of the village. It is unfortunately very difficult to be precise about the numbers of households that will see an uplift in broadband speeds from the information available at the current time, in spite of much scruti-

ny on our part! The maps available on the Superfast Essex website appear to have a number of anomalies.

We have received notification of road closures for Spring Elms Lane/Little Baddow Road to enable BT Openreach to conduct cabling works, this is from 5th -30th June; our hope is that this is to route fibre cables for the Superfast Scheme in to the village for those on the Danbury Exchange (01245 numbers), so this is encouraging for some properties. We have also recently received notification for the installation of high speed broadband cabinets at Tom Tit Lane which is encouraging for properties in this vicinity.

We are hoping that there may be news on a similar provision from the Maldon end of things before too long (01621 numbers).

The Broadband working group is closely monitoring the outcome of this latest development as until then its impossible to know what will be in place. The group will then be in a position to explore community partnership funded options with providers if required. It's highly likely that there will be in excess of 75 properties that could still fall outside the currently planned schemes.

Our thanks to Graham Bannerman and John Brown who have been pulling together all the information and especially to John for his excellent technical expertise and for the recently published Woodham Walter Broadband Parish Update that was delivered earlier this year.

- Provided maps of local walks and tourist information.
