I am pleased to introduce Woodham Walter Parish Council's Report for the year April 2022 - March 2023 and to invite you to the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on Monday, 22nd May at 8pm in the Village Hall. We hope that as many residents as possible will attend what is an important annual village gathering.

In last year's report I wrote that the government had just announced the removal of all Covid restrictions. We all knew that the truth was that the Covid virus would still be with us and in a variety of forms into the future. And, indeed, that has been the case. I know that many have caught Covid in the interim and suffered from it, a reminder to us all to be cognisant of the risks that remain. And, unsurprisingly, there is a lack of confidence about stepping back into an active social life and one of the themes of the Parish Council's work in the year ahead is to find ways of encouraging



more social gatherings in the village and to find new ways of communicating advice and guidance in the challenging world in which we now live. There is more on that later in this report but it is worth noting at this point that the Queen Vic remains closed - a victim partly of the pandemic and partly of changing social habits. Over the years it has been a community hub for many in the village, but sadly as of now there is no news as to wheth-

er it will re-open and if so in what form.

The composition of the Parish Council has remained unchanged over the past year. Indeed, this May's Parish Council election was uncontested, and so all seven existing councillors have been duly re-elected.

The Council comprises John Brown (Vice Chairman) who has very valuably brought his experience to bear on IT issues and on the installation of a new finance system; James Bunn; Jenny Hughes; Joanna Symons (chairing both last year's Platinum Jubilee celebrations and also this year's local celebrations of the Coronation of HM King Charles III, in addition to representing us as a Governor at our Primary School); John Tompkins (whose expertise in matters of planning and design is a much appreciated asset); and Peter Warren (who as our Footpaths and Tree Officer relentlessly pounds those paths through the Village, ensuring that all is in good order by reporting on issues that need to be addressed by Essex County Council or local landowners). I am responsible to the Council for the allotments. Everyone contributes their own very considerable individual skills and knowledge to the Parish community, and I would like to thank everyone for their wholehearted commitment and for the time that they give on a voluntary basis.

Our Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer - and our one employee - is Jacky Bannerman. Jacky has held this a position since 2006. It is still a part-time role – perhaps that is surprising to many, given the presence and profile that Jacky has in Woodham Walter – but, remarkably, it is. But it is true that the hours do continue to increase because of the changing demands of the role. Without Jacky the Parish Council could not operate and serve the Village as it does, and, as I said last year, we are very fortunate to have the benefit of Jacky's guidance and expertise and the services of one who is so very dedicated to our community and whose commitment extends far beyond the pure administration of Council affairs. I am sure that everyone will join with me in thanking Jacky for all that she has done over the past year.

Importantly, this past year Jacky studied for, completed and passed her

CiLCA (Certificate in Local Council Administration) with flying colours. This is a significant achievement for Jacky, but it also has tangible value for the Parish Council. With Jacky's qualification along with other criteria the Parish Council has been able to take on the General Power of Competence. The GPC gives local councils confidence in their legal capacity to act for their communities. It encourages councils to use this power to work with others in providing cost -effective services and facilities in innovative ways to meet the needs of local people.



We have recently been successful in our application to the Local Council Award Scheme—Foundation Level. Awards given under this scheme celebrate the successes of the very best local councils as part of a framework to support all local councils to meet their full potential. More on this on page 4 of the report.

Finally, we acknowledge the roles that our Essex County Councillor, Jane Fleming, and our Maldon District Councillors, Simon Morgan and Mark Durham, representing the Wickham Bishops and Woodham Ward, play in attending Parish Council meetings and being accessible for their advice, a key part in the threeway communication between Parish, District and County. And we congratulate Cllrs. Morgan and Durham on their re-election this month. We are fortunate to have representatives who know the village, the area and its environment so well.

The principal consumer of time, for Jacky Bannerman and for the Parish Council, in and out of meetings, is the consultation on, and consideration and administration of, our response to planning applications in all forms. These range across a wide spectrum of permissions as outlined in the analysis below. Whilst the number of new applications has de-

clined, the workload has not, mainly as a result of the size, complexity and multi-faceted nature of many applications and appeals.

In the past year the most significant planning application requiring our attention was the Warren Estate's Appeal against the refusal of permission to build a large number holiday lodges at Bunsay Downs and at Wayside. The Parish Council, whilst technically being a third party to the Appeal, presented a strong paper calling for the Appeal to be dismissed; we attended every day of the Inquiry established to determine the Appeal, and were given the opportunity to speak and to ask questions. I thank all Councillors for the many hours of work put into presenting our case, but particularly Cllr. Tompkins for his expertise and contribution to that process. Our position was supported by a very significant number of written opinions from within the village and beyond, and the result was that the Inspector dismissed the Appeal. I cannot stress how important for the village this decision was, and how significant both the work of the Parish Council and also the coming together of so many in this community to resist the Appeal were in achieving that end.

Our role in the planning process is a vital function of the Parish Council, since we represent the views of those who know the Village and its rural environment best, and we seek to convey those views with clarity and emphasis to Maldon District Council. The Woodham Walter Village Design Statement was launched in 2017 and adopted that year by Maldon District Council, and is often referred to in planning decisions. Cllr Tompkins continues to oversee the updating of the VDS in order to take account of changes in the planning environment since 2017, and with an ear to the ongoing discussions at governmental level on the revision of the National Planning Policy Framework. The VDS plays a vital role in obtaining decisions that are appropriate to the Village.

One final point on planning relates to enforcement, the responsibility for which lies with Maldon District Council. Enforcement relates to the process of investigating and resolving possible breaches of planning law, including the upholding of conditions attached to approved planning applications, all according to MDC's Enforcement Policy. Sadly, and much to the irritation of the Parish Council and of many residents, the performance of the Enforcement Department at MDC has been particularly questionable over recent years, resulting in long, drawn-

out and unresolved correspondence in relation to what are evidentially serious breaches of planning conditions. As a result of what has been from our perspective a lack of any improvement in performance we have entered into a three-stage formal Complaint procedure with MDC. Our Complaint relates both to specific breaches of conditions, which despite many and frequent communications from the Parish Council to MDC have been left unenforced over time, and also to the general levels of resource, communi-

cation and performance within the Enforcement Department. We expect to meet with senior officers at MDC in the coming weeks and aim to have a productive discussion, with a sensible resolution of these areas of concern.

Finally, to revert to the question of 'community', Woodham Walter is fortunate to have many organisations, groups and committees that contribute actively to the benefit of the local community as a whole and all involving a large number of very committed volunteers - for instance, St Michael's Church, under the inspired leadership of Rev'd Julie Willmot, Woodham Walter Primary School (which after much effort has been able to add the essential resource of a new, additional classroom), Tadpoles Nursery, the revitalised Village Hall, the redecorated Women's Club, the Bell Meadow Village Association, the Neighbourhood Watch group, the defibrillator team, Friends of St Michael's, the Essex Wildlife Trust volunteers, and the Allotment Association, all of which have contributed to our Annual Report. And these are in addition to our two excellent pubs and two golf courses, as well as the asset of the Playground on Bell Meadow, which has become so well-used and a

gathering point for parents (and for grandparents) with young children.

But there is a sense in which perhaps there are not as many village gettogethers as there used to be. Perhaps the pandemic has influenced that. (Having said that, there has, of course, been plenty of evidence of community spirit over the past year at last summer's Top Road street party which formed the centre-piece of our Platinum Jubilee celebrations, the mourning of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's passing and very recently the celebration of HM King Charles III's coronation, in addition to last September's Bell Meadow Day.)

So, the Parish Council has initiated Walter's Third Thursday Café at the Village Hall in order to give an opportunity for as many as possible to come together on an informal basis to catch up on local news, to meet new and old friends and to enjoy the company of neighbours with whom there is perhaps less contact than

there once was. I also hope that our efforts to focus on environmental and climate change issues over the coming months, to include a gathering in the summer, will result in a new sense of shared direction, interests and goals across the village as a whole.

I look forward to continuing in my role as Chairman over the next year and send all good wishes for health and happiness to everyone in Woodham Walter.


Woodham Walter Parish Council's Chairman responded to the good news with Congratulations to all the team - and thanks to Jacky for all the work that was put into the successful application.


Woodham Walter Parish Council - Financial Overview

Parish Councils with an annual turnover below £25,000 have to adhere to the Transparency Code. Although Woodham Walter now exceeds this threshold, we think it's important to continue to provide information for you to review. Information is published on the Parish Council website so that parishioners can view financial documents, agendas and minutes in order to meet the Governments desire to place more power into citizens' hands to increase democratic accountability. Transparency gives local people the tools and information they need to hold local public bodies to account. The Parish Council accounts are subject to an external audit review and this is usually completed by the end of September. What do Parish Councils do?

Powers and duties

Parish councils have a large range of powers and activities.

Woodham Walter Parish Council is involved in planning consultations, managing Bell Meadow, the playground, the Memorial Garden and the general care and upkeep of the village, including, liaising with Highways, street lighting, promoting the village and any other local issues.

We provide community funding to local organisations to help with maintenance including Woodham Walter Women's Club and Woodham Walter Village Hall Association. We give an annual grant to the Essex Wildlife Trust towards their work managing Woodham Walter Common on our behalf.

Spending plans for 2023/24 include contributing to HM the King's Coronation Event and giv-

ing a small memento to all the children in the parish along with our other regular expenditure.

How parish councils work

Parish councils are statutory bodies. Members are elected for a term of four years. 2023 was an election year and all our Parish Councillors were elected uncontested.

Parish Councils are funded principally by an annual precept. Income and expenditure for the next financial year are calculated in the form of estimates. The net amount (the precept) is added to council tax, collected by Maldon District Council (the principal authority) and paid to Woodham Walter Parish Council annually. Parish councils can apply for other funding such as grant and funding awards, but they do not receive funds direct from central government, as principal authorities do.

Woodham Walter Parish Council also receives income from the hire of the Party Tents. During 2022 we raised f_0650 in hiring income.

Councillors have agreed that the precept requirement for Woodham Walter in 2023/24 will be £228,665 which works out at £105.35 per Band D property for the year.



What do Parish Councillors do?

As a councillor you become a voice for your community. Parish Councils are the most local part of our democratic system and closest to the public. Councillors have three main areas of work:

- 1. Decision-making: through attending meetings and committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented. Woodham Walter Parish Council meets on the 2nd Monday of the month at 8pm for approximately 2 hours.
- 2. Monitoring: councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.

3. Getting involved locally: as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. This often depends on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available.

The work of a parish councillor may include:

- going to meetings of local organisations
- going to meetings of bodies that affect the wider community, such as the police, the Highways Authority, the local Council and schools
- taking up issues on behalf of members of the public.
- Neighbour consultations for planning applications.
- Inspections of Bell Meadow.

Being a parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community and helping to make it a better place to live and work. Members of the community nominate candidates for election. All registered electors are encouraged to vote so that you can have a direct impact on the make up of the Parish Council which represents the local community of Woodham Walter.

How can Woodham Walter contribute?

Woodham Walter Parish Council has recently adopted a Climate Action Statement and a Biodiversity Policy. In brief, these two documents confirm amongst other things our commitment to:

- increasing the information and advice available to Parish residents on how best to protect our environment with a view to playing our part in achieving national net zero targets; and
- sharing advice and ideas for conservation and enhancement of biodiversity within Woodham Walter with residents across the spectrum of ages.

The evidence of global warming is all around us. We may only be a small community but we need to contribute to the UK's efforts to reduce carbon emissions and to protect and increase biodiversity. Our work would have little noticeable impact on a national scale but it would make Woodham Walter itself a safer, more sustainable and greener environment.

For this to be effective, we need residents to help and to be involved. The Parish Council cannot do this effectively without your help.

We hope that residents will feel sufficiently passionate about this issue to be interested in forming a Working Party to drive our fight against Climate Change.

We are currently planning a Climate Action event which will take place in the Summer. We will have invited guests to talk about their areas of expertise, provide advice and information. We are also looking for those who have already taken their own initiatives to come forward and tell us of their experience. 

Walter's Third Thursday Cafe

The Parish Council has long felt that an opportunity to provide a social meeting hub for village residents would be beneficial. Especially since lock down and all the changes that this has brought.

Walter's Third Thursday Café began on 20th April. We were delighted that about 40 people attended and we received lots of very positive comments.

A team of volunteers set out the Village Hall and served teas and coffees to the visitors. Sue Williams very kindly played the keyboard which helped create a lovely atmosphere.

Part of the idea for Walter's is to provide a Community Hub with advice and information on subjects such as Health & Wellbeing, Crime and Fraud prevention, Home Safety and lots more.

Hopefully soon the Village Hall will have a broadband connection and this will enable us to provide a Digital Buddy service for help with using devices, the internet and email. Plus you will still be able to check your emails while you're having a cuppa at Walter's! There is an information corner with leaflets and advice for guests to have a look through.

Walter's is also a collection point for pink recycling bags and green food caddy liners.

There is a children's corner with some games and colouring organised by Pam Seear.

Each month invited guests will provide advice and information. At the April meeting we were joined by Essex Fire & Rescue Service who were on hand to office home safety advice and arranged to make house visits to 7 residents to give advice about smoke alarms.

At the next meeting on 18th May we will be joined by the Community Agent, Kelly Coombs to learn about the role she plays in the community. Karis Galliano from United in Kind will also be in attendance to tell us how they help people around Essex to tackle loneliness and isolation through acts of kindness.

We are pleased to report that the Parish Council was successful in its application to the



Maldon District Council Community Hub Grant Scheme and have received £1000 funding for Walter's. Along with Parish Council funding, this will cover costs for the year so the event is completely free of charge to guests. Where possible we will also be sourcing our refreshments from local supermarkets—Tesco donating all of the teas and coffee for our first event.

Future guests include the Essex Police Fraud Prevention Officer, Maldon Community Voluntary Service, the Essex Police Rural Crime Team. If you have any ideas for guests please let us know.

Parish Clerk's Report — Jacky Bannerman





I have been Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer of Woodham Walter Parish Council for 16 years. The Parish Clerk is the proper officer of the council and as such is under statutory duty

to carry out the functions, serve or issue all notifications required by law and carry out the decisions of the Parish Council. The Clerk advises councillors and produces the information required to help them make effective decisions.

This council year (April 22-Mar 23) has been particularly busy. In that time I successfully studied and passed the Certificate in Local Council Administration (CiLCA). Along with meeting other criteria, by having a qualified Clerk the Parish Council has now taken on the General Power of Competence. The GPC gives local councils confidence in their legal capacity to act for their communities. It encourages councils to use this power to work with others in providing cost-effective services and facilities in innovative ways to meet the needs of local people. On top of this, we have recently been awarded Foundation level in the National Local Council Awards Scheme. (See page 4)

The Parish Council is responsible for maintaining Bell Meadow and a number of grass verges and hedges, including the Memorial Garden, street lighting and the general care and upkeep of the village. We are also part of the Planning consultation process.

Last year I reported on the task of claiming the Memorial Garden land for the Parish. It has taken just over a year for the application to proceed with Land Registry and we are pleased to announce that the Parish Council are now officially registered as the owners of this land.

Every year we provide community funding to Women's Club and Village Hall Association to help with maintenance. The Parish Council are the custodians of Woodham Walter Common and we make an annual grant to the Essex Wildlife Trust towards their work managing the common on our behalf.

The Parish Council has a Grants programme so that local good causes can apply for funding for specific projects. The application documents and criteria are on the website, the deadline is 30th September in each year. Grant awards will be made to eligible clubs, charities, organisations or societies where it can be demonstrated that it will be of benefit to the village, residents or community of Woodham Walter.

Other expenditure last year included the Community Engagement Team who are contracted for up to 5 hours per month (this includes TruCAM speed detecting and parking enforcement). The CET inspect the playground facility for us each week and provide a more detailed monthly inspection.

The goal posts have been the source of some discussion again this year. They continue to be well-used and we have installed additional ground anchors —the goals should not be moved other than by the Parish Council or our contractors. Unfortunately we had an incident earlier this year where they were moved and damaged. We plan to replace the goals soon (assuming that they are not vandalised again) and have been saving up. We are currently researching grants that we can utilise to reduce the costs to the parish. We were fortunate to received some funding from the Bell Meadow Village Association.


I was pleased to be part of the organising team for the Platinum Jubilee events in June 2022. Firstly we held a celebration for the School and Tadpoles on Bell Meadow and Rev. Julie blessed the new Oak Tree planted as

part of the Queen's Green Canopy. All the children were presented with a Platinum Jubilee mug, certificate and ice lolly. We also arranged a Street party along Top Road (see page 19)- Another memorable Woodham Walter occasion. Thanks again to everyone who got involved and attended.

We were of course impacted greatly by the sad death of HM Queen Elizabeth in September and I have written a separate article on page 20.

We have just held a celebration for the Coronation of HM King Charles III, but due to deadlines a full account is not possible in this report. I organised the event along with my colleague Cllr. Joanna Symons and a group of residents who offered their help. It was another fantastic Woodham Walter event and with sunshine too! We organised bespoke tea towels which were sold along with gifts of bookmarks for all of the children in the parish including the School and Tadpoles.

I have for some time wanted to organise a regular community coffee morning and am pleased to say that the Parish Council fully support this initiative and Walter's Third Thursday Café began on Thursday 20th April in the Village Hall. We were pleased to receive funding from the Maldon District Council Community Hub Grant scheme. About 40 people attended the April Walter's café and it was a very enjoyable morning. Offering free refreshments, advice and information in a social setting. Each month we will have different guests-please come along and see what it's all about. The next one is on Thursday 18th May from 10-12.



Parish Clerk's Report – Jacky Bannerman



We are pleased to support the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme by taking on young volunteers to do various tasks around Bell Meadow and the village as part of their Community Volunteering. We are very grateful to them for their help in watering the trees and hedging on the Memorial Garden and for helping to plant new hedging. They do litter picks and other duties such as clearing the leaves from inside the Playground. We were very grateful they took on the task of re-varnishing the noticeboard and made a very good job of this. This has been a big success and when they have finished their commitment we will be looking for another volunteer to carry on this role. Get in touch if you're interested.

This year volunteers have completed repairs to the Memorial Shelter and we are very grateful for their help. We plan to replace the main noticeboard and provide some new bins. We have begun a long term programme of replacing the street lighting to LED lights. We have so far replaced the Top Road and Church Hill lights. This is becoming a requirement as the old lighting becomes obsolete and parts no longer widely available.

Our website continues to be regularly updated with lots of information about the work of the Parish Council, Planning, as well as Useful Links, a Noticeboard and other local information.

I send out a village email from time to time with information relevant to villagers—such as any major planning applications, road closures,

changes to bin and recycling collections and Parish Council meeting reports along with District, County and other useful information



There are currently 188 subscribers but with over 250 properties in the village there are many people who are missing out! Scan the QR code or visit our website to sign up.

My regular walks around the village are rarely without clearing drains of leaves and taking photos of pot holes, flooding etc. Highways reports take up a surprising amount of time and are not without frustration. Many is the time that a report "does not meet the criteria and will be monitored" when we think it should be dealt with promptly. We are able to access support from our County Councillor which I have done on several occasions. Open cases include the blocked drains on Church Hill and the pot hole at the end of Top Road. One of the biggest Highways issues of the last couple of years has been Hoe Mill Bridge. We continue to liaise with Highways, County Councillor Jane Fleming and our District Councillor 's regarding future works to replace the bridge and understand a number of schemes are being investigated.

Another topic which takes up a large part of my time is Planning and Enforcement. There's nothing like a controversial planning application or appeal to create a stir in the village

and my inbox! The Parish Council notifies applications via the village email system and all planning applications are put on our website with links to the planning documents and any response made by the Parish Council. Of course in the last year we have heard that the Warren's appeal was unsuccessful—this being one of the biggest draws on our time over the last couple of years.

Sadly I am all too frequently notified of fly tips in the parish. I report these to Maldon District Council who generally attend promptly. You can report fly tipping directly to MDC by filling in the on-line form on their website



www.maldon.gov.uk

The Playground has now been in place for well over a year and has weathered well. My role now includes monitoring and ensuring that the playground remains safe and serviceable. Please report any issues to us.

Over the last few years the Parish Clerk's job has evolved and I am very grateful to the Parish Council and the village community that this is recognised. Woodham Walter is lucky to have a full team of supportive and dedicated councillors and I thank them all for their valued time and judgement.

Village Design Statement — Cllr. John Tompkins



The Village Design Statement (VDS) has been in use since it was approved by the Maldon District Council (MDC) in 2017 and has proved to be extremely useful for both the Parish Council and for the MDC when consulting on or determining planning applications. Although a guide, it is nevertheless an important supplementary planning document forming an integral part of the local planning authority assessment and carries some weight. In consequence residents wishing to make a planning application should carefully consider it with their consultants before making their planning submission.

Since the original document was produced, legislation has been changed with further elements being introduced including national and local design codes. Additionally, the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) is currently undergoing consultation on a major upgrade thus the Parish Council decided, in conjunction with their response to the NPPF consultation, to review the existing document. The review is taking into consideration the governmental changes, as well as accommodating

the experience that has been gained in assessing planning applications against the VDS and reinforcing areas where necessary.

You will have undoubtedly read in the press, seen on the television and social media or heard on the radio about the changes that may affect local development plans with the supply of development land – all this could be about to change. This affects the village for, although there is a defined settlement area (DSA) that is supposed to safeguard from rapacious and exploitative speculative development, unless the current 5year housing land supply can be maintained across the Maldon District, the rules pertaining to DSAs are put in obeyance. The Parish Council, through one of the District Councillors, has raised the matter with the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities of the United Kingdom in the hope that there could be more protection from creeping, banal urbanity for rural villages such as Woodham Walter as defined in the VDS.

The newly re-formed VDS group of three has already started on a significant survey of the design character and setting of every property in the Village but delayed by the potential national changes outlined above, the Warren Lodges Appeal and by ill-health of members. It is hoped to recommence in the near future to be ready to incorporate the findings in an updated, supplementary VDS

document following the publication of the new NPPF during the latter end of next year. This of course may change if the political background changes following a general election.

Notwithstanding this, the basics of the VDS remain extant and it is urged that these be considered by residents if, or when they are considering a planning application or building under Permitted Development (PD) rules. Elements such as fenestration, materials and roofs, combined with design are really important elements when considering the local setting and environment. Most PD such as Change of Use Prior Approval applications (COUPA) give little opportunity to comment or object but it is hoped that applicants will adhere to the VDS principles. The regulations regarding the Conservation Area and Listed Buildings remain unaltered and there is now a supplementary Local List of buildings of historic or architectural interest that will be fully integrated with the VDS.

The VDS group are closely monitoring the national planning changes and are exploring other avenues that may help in conserving and enhancing the character, beauty and peace of Woodham Walter for future generations. Members are always happy to assist or advise through the Parish Council Clerk.

Material Planning Considerations


When making or commenting on a planning application the material considerations include:

- · Layout and density.
- Loss of amenity.
- Loss of light/overshadowing.
- Adequacy of parking/loading/turning.
- Traffic generation/highway safety.
- Noise/pollution and disturbance.
- Design and appearance.
- Effect on heritage (listed buildings/conservation area/ archaeology).
- Previous relevant planning history of the site.
- Sustainability
- Local economy and employment opportunities.
- Cumulative impact.
- Effect on the character/appearance of the area/ landscape quality/protected areas.
- The fall-back position e.g., extant planning consent on the site and any permitted development rights.

It is also important to identify matters which are **not material** considerations. These include:

- Competition between businesses.
- Comments relating to personal morals or views about the applicant.
- Matters covered by other legislation e.g., environmental health, building control.
- Perceived loss of value.
- Private disputes e.g., property boundary matters.
- Covenants on the land.
- Loss of a private view.
- Impact of construction work.
- Profit that may be made by the developer.
- Moral objections to development.
- That work has already been carried out.

Woodham Walter Conservation Area




Woodham Walter has a designated Conservation Area and Article 4 Direction. This is in the central village area. You can view more information on the MDC or Woodham Walter websites.

Establishing a conservation area immediately places firmer planning controls over certain types of development. The main additional requirements include the following:

- 6 weeks' notice must be given to the local authority before works are carried out to any tree in the area. This does not include trees whose trunks have a diameter of less than 75mm above ground level
- Planning permission is required for the demolition of any unlisted building with a volume of more than 115 cubic metres
- Planning permission is required to demolish a gate, fence, wall or railing over 1 metre high next to a highway (including a public footpath or bridleway) or public open space; or over 2 metres high elsewhere
- Planning permission is required for alterations to the roof of a dwelling house resulting in a mate-

- rial alteration to its shape, notably dormer windows
- Planning permission is needed for the installation of a satellite dish on a chimney, wall or roof slope which faces onto and is visible from a public highway
- Planning permission is needed to clad any part of the exterior of a dwelling house with stone, artificial stone, timber, plastic or tiles.




Chelmer & Blackwater Conservation Area



The other Conservation Area within our Parish is the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation Conservation Area. This forms a central element of the lower Chelmer Valley which is described as a major landscape feature. Woodham Walter is within Zone 6: Little Baddow to Hoe Mill Lock and Zone 7: Hoe Mill Lock to Langford Pumping Station.

The character of Zone 6 is described as quiet, rural remote from development and has the most valuable land-scape of the Conservation Area.


Zone 7 is described as having more pasture and more mixed native vegetation along the water-body banks. Enlarged arable fields are prominent on the north bank and can give an impression of a flat open landscape.



The document explains that conservation of existing qualities is a major requirement particularly in rural zones 6 and 7.

District Councillor—Simon Morgan





Having been elected in a byelection on 24 February 2022 – the same day that Russia invaded the Ukraine – hopefully not an ill omen - much of my time has been spent in getting to grips with my duties a District Councillor and getting to know the five Parish Councils that constitute my Ward.

I have to say that the latter requirement has been a challenge but also a joy. The Wickham Bishops and Woodham Ward includes Five Parish Councils, which I think is the most in any Ward in the Maldon District, and all Five of them are constituted with vibrant and committed Councillors who bring to their Council its own significant and definitive character. It has been a pleasure

and a privilege to have met and interacted with them all.

Following my election and the Statutory Annual Council meeting in Mat 2022 I was appointed to the North West Area Planning Committee, The District Planning Committee, the Oversight and Scrutiny Committee, the Local Highways Panel and was made Vice Chairman of the Licensing Committee.

Subsequently I was appointed to the 5 Year Housing Land Supply Working Group, the Corporate Projects Working Group and the Strategic Housing Board. Of particular interest to the Parish of Woodham Walter is the 5 Year Housing Land Supply. Essentially, if a planning authority cannot show that it has one, then developers can seek to make speculative applications and hope to challenge any refusals upon appeal.

Unfortunately, in June of last year, Maldon District Council's 5 Year Housing Land Supply was assessed as 3.66; woefully below the required level. Thankfully, officers and members through the Working Group have managed to get that figure up to 5.1 as an-

nounced at the Last Full Council meeting on 30 March 2023.

As regards my other responsibilities they have not had any specific relevance to Woodham Walter. We were, of course, delighted to see the opening of the new classroom last month.

Otherwise, I have done my best to assist the Parish Council with its concerns as to possible planning contraventions and to make its voice heard at District planning Committee meetings.

I would like to pay tribute to my fellow District Councillor Mark Durham, and County Councillor Jane Fleming for all the help and support that they have given me over that last year.

Event overview



Vehicles cannot be parked on the event route from 05:00 on Saturday 27 May until the roads reopen. Any vehicle left on the route or parked in a suspended parking bay will be relocated.



As a Parish Council we have various duties to carry out and the death of the Sovereign brought with it various tasks expected of local councils and of course for most of us this was the first time we have experienced this occasion. As Parish Clerk it was quite a task, understanding the etiquette and in some instances the law.

The first duty was to announce the death by putting up notices and changing our website front page. This was done on the day of the announcement.

We were due to have a Parish Council meeting a couple of days later, but this had to be cancelled as per the guidance, but with this comes more considerations—the council still needs to function.

There was a plan in place for other matters which had to be dealt with including that we had already purchased a Book of Condolence and some picture frames in anticipation and these were quickly delivered along with suitable photograph to St Michael's so that parishioners could pay their respects.

We were also advised to create a Focal Point for Grief. This was agreed to be the bench on the Memorial Garden opposite the Church. A quick dash to the florist for suitable wreaths from the Parish Council and St Michael's and a hastily organised ceremony to lay the wreaths was arranged with Rev. Julie members of the Parish Council and the PCC.

The advice was that the focal point for grief should remain in place until the day after the funeral and then the flowers composted. This was completed and the resulting compost was then used when we planted the new hedging at the top of the Memorial Garden—and these have been registered as part of the Queen's Green Canopy.



We decided that we would perform a Reading of the Proclamation Ceremony. This being the official announcement following the passing of Her Majesty, Proclaiming the new King. This was organised at Bell Meadow on the Sunday and despite the short notice was very well attended (the power of the village email and village grapevine). The Chairman of the Parish Council, Cllr. James Rushton did an excellent job of reading the official statement.

This was followed by the singing of the National Anthem and chants of "God Save The King".

Etiquette dictates that a letter be written to the new Monarch's Private Secretary. This was done in October along with offering the condolences of the Parish Council and residents of Woodham Walter and that the Book of Condolence will be kept in the Parish archives.

Buckingham Palace must have been inundated because the response to our letter arrived in April of this year! A lovely card of appreciation.




I personally was proud to have been involved in this historic moment.

Bell Meadow Wildflower & Bug Hotel

As part of the Parish Council's Coronation legacy, along with our commitment to a biodiversity policy it was decided to create a wildflower area at Bell Meadow.

With thanks to our grounds maintenance contractors, Skippers who have created the area as a kind gesture to the community. We look forward to seeing how the area grows with a selection of native wildflowers over the coming seasons and with the aim of managing the area as a lasting wildflower area.

You will see that the Coronation event also provided funding for the new bug hotel "Bugingham Palace" which has also been dedicated to commemorate the coronation of King Charles III. The idea was born out of the Coronation Working Party deciding that a fitting tribute to HM The King would be to support his interests in Biodiversity and the environment. The structure was made for us by Suffolk charity Monkey Workshops. This was filled with sticks, cones, straw etc partly at an event with the School and Nursery on Friday 5th May and then completed and opened at the Coronation Event on Sunday 7th May.

We manage unauthorised encampments on ECTU Partner land, and the 12 local authority sites for Gypsies and Travellers.

The Essex Countywide Traveller Unit (ECTU) is a partnership of Essex County Council, local councils, Essex Fire and Rescue Service and Essex Police. Together, we support Gypsies and Travellers to access services, including:

- supporting children into school and further education
- health services
- site and home fire safety visits

Nothing really remarkable has happened over the last year at Wood Corner.

The only change is that there is a new site manager, Stuart Metcalf.

Footpath Officer - Peter Warren



Although sadly I no longer have a dog to walk and keep me company, I still enjoy the job of Parish Footpath Officer, trying to make sure that our Public Rights-of-Way are clear and safe to walk. I go for a walk most days (weather permitting!) and try to cover at least a couple of paths on each walk. There are 28 footpaths plus 5 bridleways in the Parish, those close to home are checked at least once each week whereas the ones further away I endeavour to check at least every month or two. Any problems that I can't easily rectify myself are referred to the appropriate farmer or landowner, mainly fallen trees. Other problems such as dodgy gates, stiles, bridges and signs are logged onto the ECC Highways online reporting system. Anything really urgent or dangerous is referred directly to the new Rights of Way Inspector for this area, Mr Roy Read. We have yet to meet but Roy has been very helpful with any issue that's cropped up over the past year.

Fortunately there haven't been too many problems on our paths over the past year and they were a pleasure to walk for most of the time. The warm, wet weather last Spring made the weeds grow rather too well and several paths were difficult to walk, a couple becoming impassable. Fortunately the paths on the annual ECC cutting schedule were done in July and everywhere was good to walk again. A couple of paths were

missed (FP23 and FP33). Many thanks to The Maldon Ramblers for stepping in and clearing these. In fact we need to thank this group for a couple of other clearance jobs last year. Since The Pandemic the number of walkers has increased considerably, helping to keep the weeds trampled down. This, combined with the very hot summer and low rainfall through the autumn and winter, has meant the paths were still in good condition for most of the winter. However a very wet March has returned paths back to a muddy norm for this time of year.

Problems over the past year have included the usual crop of fingerposts and waymark posts that have rotted and fallen over or gone missing completely. Six were replaced or re-erected this winter, Despite storms and some high winds that we have suffered our paths have escaped quite lightly, only a half a dozen trees have fallen across paths. Small trees and dead branches I can deal with myself but a couple of enormous specimens have come down requiring the specialists to attend. Only one bridge problem requiring some minor work down by the canal.

The closure of The Queen Victo-

ria caused a problem organising the New Year's Day walk as most walkers look forward to a drink and a chat over a bite to eat after the walk. However Annie from The Cats came to the rescue. 37 walkers plus 5 dogs started from

The Vic as usual, enjoying a leisurely walk in pleasant weather, the 3.5 mile route finishing at The Cats. Annie very kindly provided some complimentary hot food in return for a donation to Farleigh Hospice. Everybody was very generous and £420 was raised!

Whilst walking the local paths I also carry out the job of Tree Officer. This is to satisfy the Parish Council's responsibility to check on the safety of trees bordering the Public RoWs on WW Common, also the trees surrounding Bell Meadow. Several trees on the south and west sides of the meadow have needed dead limbs removing. After getting clearance from the MDC Conservation Officer this work has been carried out by a local tree surgeon.

Please help me to keep our paths in good order and safe to walk. If you see anything that needs attention, or any improvements that you could suggest, please let me know. Or even better, join the gang of mystery pruners who must go walking with a pair of secateurs in their pocket, keeping the brambles at bay! Lastly, fingers crossed that we have yet another good summer to enjoy our lovely WW countryside!

How time flies. This year has obviously been dominated by the cost of living crisis and the impact of inflation on budgets and

the delivery of services.

In response, a Cost of Living Summit was held at County Hall in November last year, where ECC announced their latest plans to support families and households through the winter.

The plans announced detailed how over £8.6m from the Household Support Fund would be used to support those residents who may otherwise struggle with the cost of energy, to buy food, pay for household bills or to meet other essential living costs. Funding was directed to food support groups, the extension of food vouchers for free school meals for families, help with energy costs and grants for community and voluntary organisations. Support provided included: $\int 3.75 \, \text{m}$ for the provision of food vouchers for the December 2022, February and Easter 2023 school holidays for eligible children aged 4-19 and 2-4-year-olds who are entitled to pupil premium or attract free entitlement funding supplement, £1.8m towards the Essential Living Fund which enables vulnerable people to pay for essential items, £135,000 to fund warmth hampers for care leavers, £1m to support households where those with disabilities use assistive equipment to maintain their health and wellbeing and that requires use of electricity, a new £400,000 grant to schools to support vulnerable families in addition to the free school meal vouchers. Support was also directed to: £280,000 to the voluntary and community sector, £,100,000 to the Citizens Advice Bureau to provide additional capacity, £300,000 to support Essex food

support groups, £300,000 to support a food education programme managed by Active Essex, £90,000 to support young carers, £100,000 to support the Winter Warmth Fund, £85,000 to support community winter resilience and hospital discharge

Essex County Council also produced a round-up of different Cost of Living help and an online hub where information is updated as and when new support becomes available. ECC also continued to provide the holiday free school meal vouchers scheme it has run successfully since Christmas 2020. Free school meal vouchers were made available to around 50,000 eligible pupils across Essex during school holidays thanks to renewed funding from the Department for Work and Pensions. The funding of f.1.5m was allocated by the County Council from the Household Support Fund grant. The fund aims to support those in most need this winter with the cost of food, energy, water bills and other essentials. The Vouchers were sent to parents of eligible children and young people via their school, college or early years setting before the holidays started. They are worth £15 a week per child and can be used to buy food in most supermarkets. In addition, in December through the ActivAte Programme, there were 223 clubs, trips and family Christmas experiences available, offering fun physical activity, food education and healthy meals with 48 of the clubs offering special support for SEND pupils or mental wellbeing support. These clubs were open to young people eligible for free school meals, as well as children from working families who may be struggling financially and require extra childcare sup-

The ECC Locality Fund reopened for applications in May this year but with only £5k allocated per Division. I'm pleased to say that like last year,

every last penny of the funding specifically allocated for the Maldon Division Locality Fund, was spent. Projects that benefitted this year were St Peter's Hospital Café work to end period poverty, North Fambridge Village Hall installation of a disabled access, The Maeldune Centre in Maldon creation of a new website, and the Woodham Walter Allotment Group. My thanks go to the councils and community groups who approached me with their projects and for the hard work put in.

The remaining Locality funding was directed to a new fund - the Local Levelling Up Fund. This new scheme, gave all members a great opportunity to become involved in ECC's important levelling up work. Each County Councillor was attributed £5k and then asked to come together on a district basis, with fellow county councillors to discuss how to use the money together. This allowed for larger schemes across areas to be driven forward by the local members with funding. The money was directed to cohorts of people who were identified as a priority for levelling up. These were people with SEND, learning disabilities, or mental health conditions (children and adults), children on free school meals, working families on low incomes and young adults (16-25) who have not been in education, training, or employment for more than six months.

We (the ECC Division Members for the Maldon District) decided to direct funding specifically to help schools to purchase educational and pastoral care resources specifically to support disadvantaged and vulnerable children at Homework, Breakfast and Tea Time Clubs.

The projects that I put forward in the Maldon Division were Maldon Primary School, to purchase a chest freezer required to start their partnership with The National School Breakfast Programme; All Saints,

Maldon & Woodham Walter Primary, to purchase Chrome Books and pastoral resources to support their homework and afterschool club work, which will specifically concentrate on leaning outcomes for disadvantaged children. Other schools that benefitted in the District were St Mary's Burnham, Southminster CofE Primary, and St Cedds in Burnham.

In February, Essex County Council agreed it's new Budget for 2023/24. The Council had a stark choice in balancing its budget - of increasing taxes or facing unacceptable cuts in services. The Everyone's Essex Annual Plan and budget was approved at Full Council and the net cost of services was set at £1,176.9million (m) for 2023/24 with the net revenue budget requirement set at £1,011.2m (net cost of services less general government grants) for 2023/24 and the total council tax funding requirement set at £799.0m for 2023/24.

The Essex County Council's element of the council tax was increased by 3.5% comprising of a 1.5% increase in general council tax and 2.0% adult social care precept. This spending supports the most vulnerable in our communities including older people, people with learning difficulties, mental health difficulties and physical and sensory impairments. This result-

ed in the Essex County Council element of the council tax being £1,450.17 for a Band D property in 2023/24. At Full Council, the Cabinet Member for Highways also announced an additional £9m for highways maintenance and the Chancellor of the Exchequer recently announced £250m for highways maintenance budgets nationally – this will equate to £5.4m of additional funding for Essex highways.

In February, ECC announced the trial of a booking system for all vehicles at Essex Waste Recycling Centre. This is an extension of the pilot booking scheme that ran at the nine van friendly site for large vehicles and at the Rayleigh Recycling Centre, where all vehicle booking was piloted. The pilot is being extended to all vehicles and all locations for 9 months from March 2023. Two online booking systems running will run in parallel: large vehicles with visit slots of 1 hour and small vehicles with visit slots of 15 minutes. The number of visit slots is set at location level based on current demand and safe operating practice. The booking process is being extended to all sites to help manage waiting

> times, reduce congestion both in and around the sites, and improve the customer experience. The trial will be monitored, and amendments can be made as necessary. Any decision to retain a booking system in the longer term will be subject to further public engagement and decision. Blue badge holders and

pedestrians do not need to book a slot and bookings can be made by telephone for those who do not have access to the internet.

The plans for the new Beaulieu Park Station took a big step forward this year after the contract between Essex County Council and Network Rail was signed. The agreement allows Network Rail to enter into a construction contract with a delivery contractor with work on the highly anticipated station to commence early in the new year. The scheme together with the new Chelmsford North East Bypass, is progressing with £218 million funding from the Government's Housing and Infrastructure Fund and £34 million for the South East Local Enterprise Partnership and developer Countryside Zest. The new station, which will be the first built on the Great Eastern Mainline in over 100 years, will help to relieve pressure on Chelmsford Station, reduce car journeys into Chelmsford and support economic growth.

The Local Highways Panel work continued slowly this year, with delivery of schemes impacted by resource issues at Essex Highways. Schemes that I have submitted in the village include footway clearance on The Street and a 20s Plenty Scheme for Rectory Road around the school. Other schemes I've submitted for the Maldon District include: High Street, Maldon request for a change to kerb line and height at bus stop, Fambridge Road, Maldon request for zebra crossing, Mill Road and Wantz, Maldon request for 20sPlenty, Park Drive, Maldon request for signage to football club, Latchingdon Road, Cold Norton, request for an extension of the 30mph, St Stephens Road, Cold Norton request for 20s Plenty, Maldon Road, Woodham Mortimer and Latchingdon Road, Cold Norton, request for footway clearance and improvement.

So as the school brings about a smooth transition of leadership, our thoughts turn to everything we have achieved this year. Most notably the Governing Body have been committed to enhancing the facilities of the school and are delighted that we now have an additional teaching space in school. On Thursday 23rd March it was officially opened by the Rt Hon Priti Patel MP and the classroom is now occupied and provides a fantastic learning environment for the oldest pupils in the school.







This classroom project was achieved through the perseverance of school leaders but we could not have achieved this feat without the financial support of both members of the school community but also the wider community of Woodham Walter. What a difference that contribution is already making to young lives at the school and for that we are truly thankful.

Of course it also leaves additional spaces in school to further enhance teaching and we are already working towards our next project which is a school library and the opportunity to create more memorable learning experiences.

Similarly having given some field space over to teaching space we continue to explore ways of maximising the outdoor space available to us to ensure the children have access to the best possible sporting opportunities as well as the continued Forest School provision. Again the school cannot thank Lee and Lisa Carter enough for their continued support in allowing pupils access to the forest, teaching them how to problem solve and develop social skills as well as providing memorable learning experiences of a curricular nature, whilst also facilitating opportunities to develop pupil well being.

Our curriculum is something we are working on as a school at present. We believe that for our pupils to be successful we need to deliver on 4 things. Firstly, provide them with the fundamental skills of reading, writing and maths. Secondly, to provide them with a broad, rich curriculum in a wide range of subjects, in order to develop the artists, dancers, scientists, engineers etc of the future. Thirdly to develop life skills providing opportunities to become collaborative, empathetic, ambitious, happy citizens of the future. Finally with the context of our school, we believe it is vital that our pupils continue to have a connection with and a curiosity about protecting the natural world.









As a staff team we are creating a school curriculum that delivers on both the vision of the school but also what we passionately believe will serve the pupils of Woodham Walter both now and for the future as we continue to 'nurture lifelong learners'.

I'm pleased to report that this past year has had a number (8) of very well attended Work Parties, consequently a lot of essential Conservation work has been achieved and on target in respect of the overall Management plan for the Reserve.

PATHS: - All the paths have been very well used, there are paths that have wet sections, although even those did virtually dry out as a result of the high Summer temperatures. A few fallen trees did cause temporary obstruction to two paths, those trees were chain sawed and paths cleared.

BOGS:- Both bogs remain healthy despite the prolonged dry spell, the fallen Birch (as reported last year) was removed.

HEATHS:-

"New Heath The area looks really good, thanks two very successful Work Parties in this area, plus additional work by Catriona and myself, clearing invasive Silver Birch, some of these were quite substantial.





"Rowan Hollow" Another success!, Work completed only a month ago. At last we have managed to remove 90++% of the invasive Silver Birch, this was very hard work, involved felling, pulling and hand digging by a number of Work Parties. This removal was only achieved in the main by dedicated Volunteers/Wardens; I cannot thank them enough for their efforts.

HIMALAYAN BALSAM 1 stated in last Year's Report that it would be interesting to see how many plants would appear in 2022. (Reminder 155 in 2020, 11 in 2021). Unfortunately for this year Catriona and I removed a total of 150 in the same area.. I can only guess that a combination of robust past seeding and perfect weather conditions were responsible

OTHER MATTERS

New Ride:- I am pleased to report that the felled timber will now be used by The Trust at one of its Visitor Centres as a source of heating, actually effectively using re captured CO2. The timber will be removed when conditions permit and staff/transport is available.

We are encouraged by the fact that despite initial concerns at the time, the newly created Rides have not attracted any unwanted activity, by motorcyclists or quad bike users.

Proposed New Walking Trail:-

This new initiative is currently at the planning stage. The proposed route will pass through Woodham Walter Common and other adjacent Essex Wildlife Trust Reserves.

We welcome Volunteers. We already have a number of hard working and dedicated Woodham Walter Residents who volunteer on the Reserve, we will always welcome more!

Neighbourhood Watch - Gary Orford





In 2019 the village decided that we need to improve the communication between residents of potential or actual crimes. We set up 10 areas in the village each with a neighbourhood watch co-ordinator. In order to communicate within each group, it was decided that e-mail would be too slow and therefore Whatsapp would be the favoured medium of communication as it was easily available on smartphones. These 10 Whatsapp groups are connected to one overriding Whatsapp group of coordinators. The aim of the Whatsapp groups is to get a flow of information about incidents / suspicions in the village. This allows all residents to be engaged in crime prevention and take precautions if necessary. Information includes but not limited to:

- Suspicious vehicles in the village
- Cold callers
- Unusual behaviour of individuals / cars visiting the village
- Criminal acts in the village

It must be noted that the person identifying the crime or potential crime MUST still report it to the police in the first instance either through 999 if its serious or 101 for less serious crimes.

This year we have had a few crimes reported including: -

- Attempted robbery of a farm outbuilding.
- Actual robbery of an outbuilding of horse-riding equipment.
- Quad bikes driving dangerously around the village.
- Several suspicious vehicles in the village.

From my log this is the lowest crime level in the village since the Whatsapp group was started so I think all our good work of being nosey neighbours and warning villagers of potential situations is working.

PLEASE - DO NOT STOP REPORTING!!!!

As part of my role of neighbourhood watch co-ordinator I receive crime information from neighbouring villages as well as all "minor" crimes reported in the Maldon and Chelmsford area. Where I think its relevant, I will put out a message for villagers to be aware and to take preventative action if possible.

We try to keep the Whatsapp group messages to a minimum however it has been good to see that the messaging system has also taken on an "up to date" community warning system. Messages circulated last year included:- lost (and recovered) animals, potential door to door salesmen, blocked roads, lost keys etc.

If you get 5 minutes, can I suggest that you visit the Woodham Walter Parish Council website – https://woodhamwalter-pc.gov.uk/ where you can find "crime awareness links" under the heading "noticeboard". Here there is much information about police advice, crime prevention, cybercrime advice etc.

Lastly I would like to thank all the neighbourhood watch coordinators for their work over the last year. It is really great when everyone does a little, and together we can do loads!! — we have proved it by keeping crime to a low level.

Community Engagement Team - Nicola Syder

The Community Engagement Team are pleased to continue to work on behalf of Woodham Walter Parish Council to help look after the village and its residents.

Supporting the "Vision Zero" campaign to eliminate deaths and serious injuries on Essex roads by 2040, we work in partnership with the Safer Essex Roads Partnership to conduct speed enforcement patrols.

In the financial year ending 31 March 2023 the drivers referred to Essex Police for further action saw 32 drivers attending the speed awareness course and 1 driver being given a conditional offer, which means paying a fixed penalty charge and accepting points or attending court.

The team also carry out on street parking patrols around Woodham Walter School, at the beginning and end of the school day to keep the "School Keep Clear" area free from parked vehicles, ensuring safe passage into and out of school for pupils, parents, and carers.

We work in partnership with South Essex Parking Partnership to deliver the patrols and they have an initiative called 3PR which all schools can apply for to assist with safe parking during school times.

Periodically the team check the parking at Hoe Mill Bridge.

Whilst in the village we also carry out a visual check at Bell Meadow for issues such as dog fouling/littering and on the play equipment. We also undertake a formal monthly inspection of the play equipment on behalf of the parish council as we have a ROSPA trained member of staff.



Bell Meadow Village Association—Robert Lee/Gary Orford

Community Defibrillator —Gill Orford

Woodham Walter is fortunate enough to have our own village defibrillator, housed in the phone box outside Tadpoles, in the centre of the village. This was purchased by the Church community in 2019 after some fundraising, and I am now the defib guardian.



A defibrillator is a simple to use machine which is designed to be used in a very stressful situation. Our defib has been accessed twice this year.

As the guardian, I report on a monthly basis to Essex Ambulance Service that our defib is in current working condition. So I check the pads are in date and good condition and check that the battery is working. If the defib is used or removed from the cabinet, Essex Ambulance Service send me a notification that it has been used so that I can then take it out of service until it has been returned, potentially replacing the pads. The notifications are sent electronically so it can be done from anywhere.

I also sweep out the phone box periodically and remove the spiders!

What to do in an emergency

- Dial 999
- If the operator advises you to get the defib, you will be given the access code.
- Follow the simple userfriendly verbal instructions from the machine.
