ENERGY EFFICIENCY – SUPPORT FOR VILLAGE HALLS



Volunteers managing village halls can look forward to new opportunities for making improvements to their buildings and managing energy bills in the New Year

At the beginning of 2023, Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE) was shortlisted for a Third Sector <u>award</u> celebrating a project it

had undertaken with corporate sponsors Utility Aid which revealed that over half of England's 10,000+ village halls were experiencing <u>financial difficulties</u> due to increased energy bills.

But out of a crisis, opportunities have emerged. Whilst energy prices have remained high, many management committees secured funding for energy improvements to their building through the Platinum Jubilee Grant Fund.

And in the past month, there have been two more pieces of welcome news. First the government announced it would extend a VAT reduction scheme on the installation of Energy Saving Materials (ESMs) to buildings used for a charitable purpose in response to feedback from organisations including ACRE. And significantly, a new VCSE Energy Efficiency Scheme has been announced that will support organisations such as village halls conduct Independent Energy Assessments and apply for capital grants of up to £150k which can be used to retrofit energy improvement measures.

DOMESTIC ABUSE HELP AND ADVICE



Domestic abuse (DA) in rural areas sadly remains an uncharted territory compared to its counterpart in urban areas. It has been documented that DA lasts on average 25% longer in rural areas. Not an envious position to be in when resources are limited and isolation prevails, empowering controlling, violent and coercive behaviour. Why doesn't the victim get out? This is a common question and the answer to this is varied but the most poignant being

the more rural the setting the higher the risk of harm. Rurality and isolation serve the perpetrator and this coupled with a close knit community can deter a victim from speaking out for fear of not being believed and also retaliation. Lack of services also plays a part, but this has been recognised and work here in Essex is ongoing to improve this. These are just a few examples but enough to highlight the difficulties faced by victims of DA in rural areas. It is also important to recognise that some do not realise that they are victims of DA, most common in mental/financial/emotional and coercive abuse cases, whilst others find it hard to come to terms with their situation. This is a complex position to be in as a victim or as a friend who has concerns about someone who maybe suffering,

COMPASS

Compass is an organisation that can help and who are determined to make the change. They want people to know they are here to help no matter

where you live and particularly understand the difficulties faced by victims living in rural areas. COMPASS is a local Domestic Abuse Helpline for victims/survivors to access advice and support. COMPASS is open 7 days a week, 365 days a year. The helpline is free and confidential, aimed at anyone aged 16 or over across Essex, Southend and Thurrock. The team can also provide guidance to the public and professionals who have concerns about family, friends and people they work with who may be victims of domestic abuse. 
